

LUELLA DORRIS DIES IN EUGENE

Was Daughter Of Pioneer Springfield Merchant; Funeral In Eugene Monday

Mrs. George A. Dorris, pioneer resident of this community, passed away at her home in Eugene Friday, April 5, 1935. Luella Dorris was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. F. B. Dunn, and was born in Springfield where Mr. Dunn operated a general store for many years.

She was married to George A. Dorris on May 2, 1883 and after living in several parts of the state they returned to Eugene where they have been interested in filbert raising.

Mrs. Dorris leaves her widower; one brother, Professor Frederic S. Dunn; and three sisters, Mrs. C. S. Williams, Eugene; Mrs. Edna Digles, Berkeley, California, and Miss Amy Dunn, Palo Alto, California.

Funeral services were held Monday afternoon at 2 o'clock from the Veatch chapel in Eugene. Rev. Bryant Wilson officiated and inter-

ment was made in the old I. O. O. F. cemetery.

Beef Feeders' Day At O. S. C.

Western Oregon livestock farmers are invited to attend a beef feeders' day at Oregon State college, Tuesday, April 23, starting at 10 o'clock. The animal husbandry department has had three pens of stock cattle on feed all winter, using cheap hay and various grain supplements. The results of this experiment, which appears highly successful, will be explained, as will records of past cattle feeding tests.

It is the belief of livestock men at the college that an increased amount of winter cattle feeding would be profitable in the Willamette valley, even in years when the price advance is not as favorable as at present.

LUMBER SHIPMENTS BY WATER TO BUILD SALES

Fir Lumbermen Now in Position To Market Products in Mississippi Valley

Seattle, Wash.—A decided increase this spring in the movement of lumber from mills in the Douglas fir region in Washington and Oregon to points within the Mississippi River valley by ocean steamer via Panama Canal to New Orleans and from there by barge to destination is reported by the West Coast Lumbermen's association.

This steamer-barge movement, inaugurated last year as an experiment, appears now, the association stated, to be successful. Recent combination steamer-barge freight rate announcements show reductions of consequence when compared with the railroad freighting charges to the same points. These reductions are likely to cause a rapid expansion in the sale and use of West Coast hemlock, Western red cedar, and Sitka spruce lumber and other products from the West Coast in the Mississippi valley.

Lumbermen anticipate a growth over a period in the steamer-barge trade some-what similar to that which happened fifteen years ago when the opening of the Panama Canal to commercial vessels placed West Coast lumber on a comparatively low cost delivery basis along the Atlantic seaboard. The Atlantic Coast at that time knew only the highest grades of Douglas fir, those shipped in by railroad.

AMBERGRIS NOT FOUND ON PACIFIC BEACHES

According to J. Manheimer, head of a firm of buyers of ambergris in New York, no ambergris has ever been found on the Pacific coast beaches. In his letter to Professor O. F. Stafford of the University chemistry department, the writer says:

"Of all the specimens of so-called ambergris that have been sent to me during the many years of my experience, not one has proven to be genuine ambergris. In our experience of 60 years, we have never known of any ambergris found on the shores of the United States."

Whether because of the depression more people have time to walk the beaches, or more are willing to grasp at a chance of sudden wealth, there have been an unusually large number of "finds" recently along the shores of the United States. Mr. Manheimer says, but so far not one has rewarded the finders.

Ambergris comes from whales that have contracted sickness. Although it is far from being a perfume itself, it is regarded as a very valuable base, and if genuine and of good quality, commands a price of several dollars an ounce.

TRAFFIC COUNT REVEALS NEED OF HIGHWAY WALK

Mr. Chubb had a count taken on the week of March 16-22, a cold and rainy week. The count showed 206 persons walking east, and 156 westward, a total of 362. The count was taken between the hours of 7 a. m. and 5 p. m. and it is well-known that pedestrian traffic over the highway is heavy later in the evenings.

On one nice bright day the number of pedestrians checked was 52 east and 50 west.

E. Datus Lowell, pioneer Lane county resident for more than half a century, passed away at the Eugene hospital Sunday.

Funeral services were held Wednesday from the Veatch chapel with Rev. S. Earl Childers officiating. Interment was made in the Laurel Hill cemetery.

Mr. Lowell was born at Lafayette, Wisconsin on January 12, 1859, coming to Oregon in 1872. He lived on the Mohawk for four years before moving to Lowell.

He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Cornelia Lowell; one-half brother, Henry O'Dell at Watterville; and one sister, Mrs. Bessie Beebe in Los Angeles.
