OUTLOOK IN U.S.

Drought Areas Not To Drag Down Average Pasture Outlook Not Bright

Despite the serious drought situation in the Great Plains in an area which normally produces about 15 per cent of the agricultural output of the United States, crop prospects in general are about average for this season of the year in most of the country, says a report on the agricultural situation just released by the state college agricultural extension service. The season is starting off with coaditions good in the East, while crop conditions are above average in the west coast states and better than last year in the intermountain area, although not up to average.

The winter wheat crop is expected to fall about 183,000,000 bushels below the 1928-1932 aver age, nearly all due to poor prospects in Kansas, Texas, Oklahoma and Nebraska. The estimate, how ever, is 30,000,000 bushels above last year's winter wheat harvest. with most of the gain east of the Mississippi and in the Pacific Northwest and California.
