Long associated with civic and charitable activities of of Springfield Mr. Fulop enjoyed a very wide friendship. He was always one of the foremost leaders of the community and a generous contributor toward relief funds. No one in actual distress ever appealed to him in vain. His passing is keenly felt by the community.

Mr. Fulop was 48 years old and had been in the mercantile business in this city for about 15 years. He operated a store at Fifth and Main street for several years before selling out to Kafoury, returning later to open another store in the present location. He was an active member of the Chamber of the Lions club.

Born in Hungary

He was born at Eger, Hungary on December 25, 1886 and attended school at Debreczen, Hungary, graduating as a civil engineer when 18 years old. When he was 21 years he came to the United States and returned to Hungary in 1920, seven years later, to marry Miss Margaret A. Rozza. The same year they returned to the United States Hying first at Spokane, Washington, later in Portland, and then in Springfield.
