**More People on Farms This Year**  
Year 1935 To See 42 Million More Acres in Crops Says Report From O. S. C.  
With more acres planted, better growing conditions, and more people on farms than a year ago, gross agricultural production in the United States may be expected to be more nearly normal than in 1934, says the monthly report on the agricultural situation just released by the Oregon State college division of agriculture.

Gross agricultural production in 1934 fell about 15 per cent below normal, due to decreased plantings and heavy drought damage. This year, 42 million more acres have been planted to crops, and growing conditions are a good deal better, the report points out.

**Labor Demand Strong**  
The farm population registered a net increase of 270,000 people during the past year, bringing the total increase since 1930 up to 2,600,000. In spite of the increase in the farm population, however, the circular says that the demand for hired labor this spring was strong and farm wages advanced nearly 10 per cent during the first quarter.

The general level of farm prices in the United States has slipped back a little from a peak at mid-April of 84 per cent of the 1926-1930 average. Farm prices in the whole country are nearly 15 per cent below the pre-war parity purchasing power level, and nearly 30 per cent under parity in Oregon, according to data given in the circular.

After raising 11 per cent fewer chickens in 1934, farmers apparently will increase the number raised this year as there were 10 per cent more chicks and young chickens on farms on May 1 than a year ago. The report also reviews the situation in respect to wheat, pastures and ranges, hay, fruit and nut crops.

**HOLD LIST NEW RULES FOR LOAN**

Only Cases in Genuine Distress Accepted; Eligibility Rules Are Listed

The same tests of eligibility of HOLC applicants which have applied in the past will in general continue in full force under the new legislation just enacted providing additional funds for more loans according to John H. Fahey, chairman of the Home Owners Loan Corporation.

"No home owner should apply for a loan until he has first made certain that his application will be eligible under the Corporation's restrictions. He should realize that the rejection of an ineligible application, on grounds of deliberate default on existing debts, is likely to cause the home owner the loss of his property, because of the unwillingness of his present mortgagee to carry the loan following such default.

"The tests of eligibility are as follows:  
**Must Date To June 13, 1935**  
1. The applicant must have been in involuntary default on his home loan on June 13, 1933, and unable to carry or refund his present mortgage, unless it can be shown to the Corporation's satisfaction that a default occurring later than June 13, 1933, was the result of unemployment or other misfortune beyond the applicant's control. The Corporation was created to protect honest home owners who are in temporary difficulty, and not for the purpose of saving lenders from the results of their own past mistakes in making excessive loans, or in lending to persons not entitled to credit.

2. The past record of the applicant for integrity is a vital factor. Any applicant will be rejected as ineligible if his general record is unsatisfactory, particularly if he has deliberately defaulted on his existing indebtedness and has a record of not paying his bills when he is able to do so.

3. To redeem the home from forced sale or voluntary surrender, such sale or surrender must have taken place since January 1, 1930.

4. The applicant must be in actual distress with his mortgage indebtedness and threatened with the loss of his home by foreclosure. Applicants who have no present or prospective income of any character, and clearly could not meet the indebtedness, are ineligible unless their notes are also signed by responsible parties.

**Must Be Used As Own Home**  
5. The property must be used by the owner as his home or held by him as his homestead and, as a rule, it must have been his home on June 13, 1933.

6. The home must have a value not exceeding \$20,000 as appraised by the Corporation. No loan may be made for an amount exceeding \$14,000 or 80 per cent of the Corporation's appraisal of the property, whichever is the smaller.

7. Ordinary farm property is not eligible unless the applicant draws his main livelihood from non-farm occupations.

8. No applicant will be granted a loan if such refinancing is intended only to protect a bank loan or other business obligation.

9. The Corporation will not refinance the home of an owner who can continue to carry his present loan."

**PERMITS FOR GAS TAX APPLICATIONS READY**  
Applications for gas tax refund permits are now ready for distribution, and will be placed in the hands of all residents of the state who have heretofore been claimants under the refund provisions of the law, according to Earl Snell, secretary of state. Under an act passed by the recent session of the legislature, it is necessary to secure a permit before claiming refund a tax for gasoline consumed in industrial or farming operations, and due to the fact that this law becomes effective June 30th, all claimants should act as soon as possible.

More than thirty thousand claims for gas tax refunds, amounting to \$1,053,042.75, were paid by the secretary of state in 1934. Many of these claims involve field investigation, and an expansion of this work is probable under the new law.

**Crater Lake to Be Open Soon**  
Lodge, Cafeteria and Store To Open About June 15; To Delay Cabin Opening

Impatient vacationists have only to wait a little more than two more weeks before Crater Lake national park will be open to travel, according to the Oregon State Motor association, which has been receiving inquiries regarding the lake for the last two months.

Snow will be cleared from the road to the rim by June 15, it was announced. At that time Crater Lake lodge, cafeteria and store will be in operation, ready to take care of the many visitors expected. Housekeeping cabins will be available as soon as snow conditions permit.

**To Resume Stage Service**  
The south and west entrances leading from Klamath Falls and Medford, will be cleared of snow by about May 28, permitting motor travel as far as park headquarters, three miles from the rim.

Stage service to Medford and Klamath Falls is expected to be resumed shortly after opening of the entire road. The postoffice is scheduled to open July 1. The rim road, around the lake for a distance of 35 miles, will not be open before July 15, and possibly not until near the end of the month, the motor association pointed out.
