YONCALLA GOES DOWN

Home Folks To See Contest On Brattain Field; Large Crowd Is Expected

Whether or not the Springfield town baseball team wins the championship of the Cascade league will be largely determined here on Brattain field next Sunday when the local team will entertain Cottage Grove in the fifth game of the season.

The Springfield team has already won easy victories over Knights of Columbus and Yoncalla, and overtime games with Marcola and Hills Creek. Cottage Grove is the only team remaining on the schedule which the locals have not met this season.

Of course the game here will be only a comparative showing of strength as each team in the league is scheduled to meet three times during the season. The first round of the schedule will be concluded Sunday.

New Field Not Ready
A large crowd is expected to turn out for this game which will be played on Brattain field starting at 2 o'clock. Work was started on the new ball field out on North Mill street this week but it will not be ready for use Sunday. This will be the second game to be played here this season, the opening game with Marcola ran overtime and thrilled one of the largest groups of spectators to ever turn out for a local ball game during recent years.

John Lynch, former Springfield high school star hurler, will be on the mound for the Grove team Sunday. He will be assisted by Swanson behind the plate. Opposing him will probably be Jay Grant or Russell who will pitch to Norval Libby area receiver for the locals. The remainder of the lineup has not been announced for this game.

Yoncalla men were permitted to round the bases only twice as the game ended with the score 22-2. Three errors were chalked up against Springfield and four against Yoncalla in the game.

H.S. BALL YEAR ENDS ON TUESDAY

School Nine Wins 11, Divides Honors With Four Teams In Season Play

Springfield's high school baseball team closed an erratic season Monday at Swimmer's Delight park when they lost their final game 6-2 to Pleasant Hill, winners of the "B" league. The Hillbillies opened with a 2-1 lead in the first inning and circled the bases for four more runs in the fourth. Springfield scored another run in the fifth and final inning. Whether two more innings might have changed the result will remain unknown. Springfield has a strong defensive team as was demonstrated in the Lowell game last week when they came from behind to win in the two final innings.

A summary of the season play of Chatterton's team reveals eleven victories, nine in a row, and four losses. There was no "A" league schedule for baseball this year, but no other high school team in the district was able to equal this record with the same opposition.

The victories were Marcola 2, Pleasant Hill 1, Eugene 1, Oakridge 1, University High 2, Junction City 1, Coburg 2, and Lowell 1. Pleasant Hill, Eugene, Oakridge and Lowell each won one.

Other games included those with the Belknap CCC camp which Springfield won and with the University Frosh which the high school players lost.

Win Nine Games in Row
Springfield opened with a loss to Lowell and then won nine. After the U. O. Frosh defeat the team went into a losing slump and dropped three games before defeating Lowell.

The team boasted one of the strongest infield combinations in yeagers with Stevenson at first, White or Hutchison on second, Liles on third, Pete Taylor at short and Irvin behind the bat. It will also probably be years before the school has such an outfield combination as Scott, Posey and Darr. The pitching staff was the weakest spot on the team. Only Carson could be relied on in this position. He proved to be a good pitcher, but the necessary bunching of the games on the schedule placed a strain on the pitching staff which could stand up to, and the team did not have a good relief man to take his place.

VOTE WAGE BOOST FOR 4-L CREWS

Peaceful Negotiations Bring Workers Higher Wages and Continuous Work

While the new timber workers' union continued its picketing of strike-bound plants and its officials attempted to get a 5 cents an hour flat wage raise for its membership, the 4L board of directors peacefully voted a wage increase larger than the rates being negotiated by the new union.

Wage increases ranging from 5 to 10 cents an hour, and effective at 4L camps and mills on June 1, were voted by the 4L employe-employer group. The 4L minimum rate for common labor at sawmills and camps after June 1 will be 50 cents an hour, with rate increases in the higher brackets amounting to as much as 10 cents an hour.

The 4L board is composed of 14 employes and 14 employers, and it is significant that the wage raise carried by a 20-8 vote.

The new wage rates will immediately effect approximately 20,000 men in 4L affiliated logging camps and sawmills in Oregon, Washington, Idaho and California, and ultimately will have an upward bearing on the wages of between 35,000 and 40,000 men in the states named, for it has been customary in the past for operations not affiliated with the 4L to follow 4L leadership in the matter of wages.

Break in Strike Predicted
Close observers saw in the 4L action, the first break in the great lumber strike which for three weeks has tied up virtually all tide-water mills in Oregon and Washington. With the 4L already voting higher increases than the union has settled for at a number of struck mills, it seems likely that the general strike will have spent its force.

No one expects to see an immediate resumption of cutting at all strike-bound mills and neither 4L employe nor employer directors would say what their plans were. It was understood, however, that mills in two large districts will be re-opened in about two weeks, and others will get into their stride as soon as orders have been accumulated.
