A total of 10,200 emergency crop loans have been made by the Farm Credit Administration at Spokane since April 6, when final arrangements for the seed funds were made. Applications received, a majority from the drought areas, number 13,789.

### FORD CAR FACTS

Ford V-8 production during the first four months of the year provided approximately 36,000,000 hours of employment.

There are now some 2,400 workers employed at the Ford Motor company branch plant at Richmond, Calif., turning out between 300 and 400 Ford V-8 cars and trucks daily.

More than 25,000,000 pounds of cotton will be used in manufacturing the tires for the 'million and more' Ford cars and trucks being produced this year. Every 1935 Ford V-8 sedan that leaves the production line and goes out into service takes with it more than 70 pounds of cotton.

An all-time record for purchases of supplies and materials for Ford V-8 production is reported by Ford Motor Company officials for March, when the cost of supplies totaled \$81,000,000. During March railroad freight movement through the freight yards of the Rouge plant of the Ford Motor Company required 34,955 freight cars. This was 11 percent greater than the previous all-time record, set in February of this year. When 31,500 freight cars moved through the Rouge yards.

More water is consumed in the Rouge plant of the Ford Motor company at Dearborn, Michigan, than in the cities of Detroit, Washington and Cincinnati combined. The Rouge plant water consumption now averages 325,000,000 gallons daily. As a comparison, the city of Detroit uses 288,000,000 gallons of water daily.

Newest accessory addition to the 1935 Ford V-8 car is a vanity mirror, oval in shape, which is attached to the sun visor by small decorative bolts, and is invisible until the visor is pulled down. The mirror, because of its position, may be utilized by either front or rear seat passengers. It is made of clear, heavy plate glass with beveled edges.

## BERRY MEN STUDY Farm Program Will Continue

Control Of Pests, Irrigation Advantages, And Plant Development Shown

Effect of irrigation on berries, control of spittle bugs, and methods of pruning and training brambles drew interested attention of farmers and agricultural leaders from Oregon and western Washington who recently attended the annual small fruits day at Corvallis, sponsored by the horticultural department of the experiment station.

The recent hot, dry weather caused sharp difference between the irrigated and non-irrigated strawberries seen by the visitors. Exact comparative yields had not been obtained, but ordinary observation showed that in many instances the supplemental water had been the making of the crop.

### Control Methods Simple

Spittle bugs can be controlled at reasonable expense if attacked early enough with one of a number of effective dusts thoroughly applied. It was shown. A number of growers present reported satisfactory control with hydrated lime, with nicotine dust and with the new commercial dusts using derris derivatives as their poison base. Two well-timed, thorough applications have given good control in heavily infested patches, it was reported.

Comparative results of various methods of pruning red raspberries have not yet been obtained, as this is only the second year of a five-year experiment, but the visitors viewed the present variations in growth and fruiting habits caused by the different treatments. The plan of pinching off the tops of the new canes about two feet from the ground, thus forcing branching, appears promising, Dr. W. S. Brown reported.

### Crossing Strawberry Plants

A new method of inspecting comparative appearance and quality of new strawberries was tried this year when George Waldo, federal small fruits specialist, and 50 boxes of berries, all different kinds, arranged and labeled for the visitors to see and sample. A number of promising crosses were in the group plants of which will be saved for further study.

### The importance of keeping planting stock, of the Marshall particularly, free from virus diseases was explained by Dr. S. M. Zeller, plant pathologist. He explained the methods now being used in developing certified planting stock. Among the visitors were many Smith-Hughes teachers of agriculture from western Washington.

## President And Wallace Give Assurance: Livestock Purchases Aid To Midwest

Assurance that the work of the agricultural adjustment administration will be continued, with necessary amendment to safeguard it against difficulties encountered by the NRA, have been given by Henry A. Wallace, secretary of agriculture. A statement made by him early in June with the approval of President Roosevelt is as follows:

"In cooperation with leaders of congress, amendments to the Agricultural Adjustment act are being perfected which are intended to bring the act's provisions as to marketing agreements and licenses into line with the Schechter case decision and also safeguard the farmers' voluntary programs on basic commodities.

### No Loop Holes Seen

"Those voluntary adjustment programs were not in the path of the Schechter case decision and in no event could there be any question of the government's ability to fulfill its contracts with farmers. "Nevertheless, we have taken advantage of the decision to seek provisions in the law which will make certain the government's authority to continue processing tax rates in accordance with amended provisions of the act."

### Modernized Wheat Contracts

As a result of the overwhelming vote of approval given the wheat adjustment program, new four-year contracts are expected to be offered about the middle of July, according to word received at the extension service of Oregon State college. Provisions are understood to be much the same in general as those in the present contracts though improvements are added in a number of details.

### Hog Purchasing Saves Meat

Instead of being wasteful, the livestock purchase program of the AAA is described in a Washington dispatch as "the most extensive meat conservation program in the history of the United States." Nearly a billion pounds of meat have been conserved and made available

### STATE HEAD OPPOSES MAIL ORDER INSURANCE

## Child Clinic to Be at U.O. Again

Speech Defects, Backward Children, and Training Of Teachers To Be Stressed

Child problems will again be a feature of a special clinic at the University of Oregon Summer school opening June 24 for six weeks. The clinic has become nationally famous during the past four years and has as one of its objectives the instruction of teachers in this type of remedial instruction. Parents have brought their children from all parts of the country to the Oregon school.

The work will be continued this year under the direction of Dr. B. W. DeBask, professor of education at the university; Mrs. Lillian Raynor, of the Los Angeles public schools, and Dr. Elizabeth Montgomery, specialist in this field. Parents who have children with difficulties in reading, spelling or arithmetic may write to the school of education at the university for full information on entering the clinic.

Children with speech defects will be offered instruction under the supervision of J. A. Carrell, of the speech department.

The clinic will be used for demonstration purposes for courses in remedial teaching, open to teachers attending the summer session. Remedial teaching is becoming more and more important in education throughout the United States, and is proving invaluable to thousands of pupils who might otherwise be denied a normal education.
