It seems that the war zone has extended to the Richmond country. It was told us that Mr. F. G. Shoun was in command of the German defence. While Pat Collins probably represented the Allies, took the offensive and was going to fight for old Ireland. Both were armed with rifles. Mr. Shoun acknowledged he was afraid of Collins and would doubtless, have shot him. Sheriff Kelsay was notified and came over to get Collins, and will have him bound to keep the peace.
