FOREST NOTES

Portland, Oregon, July 15
The District Forester at Portland, Oregon announces that a report has just been received from the local National Forest officer, upon the spring planting on Mt. Hebo in Western Oregon, where, upon approximately one thousand acres, according to the report, the results have been unusually good.

It is an established policy of the Forest Service to reforest, by planting small trees or by sowing seed, several thousand acres of denuded land within the National forest every spring, and the present season's work has been in accordance with this plan. While Douglas fir was the species most largely used in the Mt. Hebo planting, other species also were planted. The weather conditions thus far have been favorable, that less than ten per cent of the trees have failed to grow. If the trees continue to do as well throughout the this their first season, the results will mean exceptionally successful planting for the spring of 1915.

WATER PERMITS IN WHEELER COUNTY

During the quarter ending June the 30, 1915, the State Engineer issued 196 permits to appropriate water, including nine for the storage of water in reservoirs. While most of the permits issued during the quarter cover small developments the estimated cost of all such developments aggregate \$734,000 involving the construction of 248 miles of canal lines, for the irrigation 21, 164 acres of land and the development of 4,254 horsepower.

The following permits were issued in Wheeler County:
R. N. Donnelly of Richmond, for domestic supply, diverting water from Rimrock and Homestead springs in Sec. 32, Tp. 9 S. R. 23 E. O. Gillenwater of Mitchell, for the irrigation of 15 acres, diverting water from West Nelson creek in Sec. 15, Tp. 18 S. R. 21 E. Ford Hendricks of Fossil, for the irrigation of 12 acres, diverting the water from Butte Creek in Sec. 12, Tp. 6 S. R. 19 E. W. L. Blann of Mitchell, for the irrigation of 11 acres, diverting water from Bridge Creek in Sec. 15, Tp. 12 S. R. 20 E.
