Snul, the great California trotter, recently made a mile on the Chicago track in 2.10.

Last Tuesday Miss Ida Carmaek, living with her parents at East Portland accidentally shot herself in the side, while handling a small pistol.

John L. Sullivan the great prize fighter has retired from the ring for a time and gone on the stage. He says there is more money in acting.

A daughter of Geo. Barrundia, attempted to shoot United States minister Mizner last Monday. She accused Mizner of having been directly the cause of her father's death, Mizner will not prosecute the lady.

A San Francisco attorney was a passenger on the steamer city of Peking that sailed for China on the 23rd ult. His business is to secure 8000 Chinese laborers to work on a railroad across the isthmus of Tehuantepec.

Deer shooting in Wash, can be indulged in from August 15 to January 15 for private consumption, but deer can be killed for market or sale only in December. It is unlawful to hunt deer with dogs at any time.

C. G. Glenn, farmer, fruit grower and horseman, ten miles south of Salem, dropped dead near his grain warehouse, three miles west of his farm Sunday at 4 o'clock while standing by his team fixing the harness. He was 60 years old, and came to Oregon in 1852.

Joseph Bessel, aged 35, and George Straussell, aged 17 were drowned at Portland on Friday of last week. They were fishing off a log, when, during the excitement attending a good bite Straussell slipped, off into the water, Bessel started to the rescue and both were drowned.

Etta Simpson, 17 years old, went to sleep a week ago Sunday, at Moncton, N. B., and has not yet awakened or taken any nourishment. Miss Simpson has for some months had a mania for eating brown paper, and it is supposed that this mania has had something to do with her illness.

Five fishermen brought to San Francisco from Alaska by the barkentine Newsboy were taken to the Marine hospital to be treated for blood poisoning. Their hands were lacerated by the fins of fish and were a mass of running sores. This was caused by the slime from the fish entering the wounds.

Years ago Tom Tobens, an old Colorado scout, was instrumental in killing a notorious bandit, who had slain a brother of Gov. Shoup, of Idaho. Recently learning of the poverty and decrepit condition of Tobens, the governor sent him a check for \$200 as a reminder that the services of the old scout were not forgotten.—Democrat.

A dispatch from the City of Mexico says the talk of the city is the shooting of Barrundia, who lived there several months and all wonder what action the United States will take in the case. The Mexican press unanimously condemns the death of General Barrundia, claiming that the American, Captain Pitts, should not have surrendered him, though the legality of the act is not denied.

United States Marshal Barin last week paid the bill of the state penitentiary for the keep of United States prisoners for the quarter ending June 30. There were fourteen United States prisoners in the penitentiary during the quarter, and their board and lodging cost Uncle Sam \$730 85. He also paid a bill for United States prisoners confined in the Umatilla county jail for the same quarter, amounting to \$50.

F. L. Washburn, of the experimental station of the State Agricultural College, visited the hop yard of S. Smeed, on the Mackenzie, this week for the purpose of ascertaining as to the presence of the reported hop louse in the yards of Lane county. He is authority for the statement that he found the hop louse (phorodon) in considerable numbers. He says there is no use denying the fact that the hop louse has made its appearance in Oregon.

The United States cruiser Charleston sailed for Hawaiian islands, in obedience to telegraphic orders received by Rear Admiral Brown from secretary of the Navy Tracy, ordering the vessel to proceed immediately to Honolulu. The occasion of the return of the Charleston to Hawaii creates anticipation of another revolution in the islands' kingdom. The Charleston has a large stock of fuel and provisions for a one year cruise.

Council Proceedings.

Council met in regular monthly session in recorder May's office Mayor Myers presiding. Councilmen Shelton, Danfcl, Shore Dille, Johnson and Morrow were present, Councilman Brenner being absent.

Minutes of last regular meeting read and approved.

Committee for the sale of the old city hall property, reported that they had sold the same to J. C. Simpson for \$250; \$150, cash and \$100 at sixty days time. The action of the committee was ratified and father time given to complete the transaction.

Recorder May reported that there was a balance on hand and in the hands of the city treasurer, Aug. 31, of \$288.26.

The resignation of Recorder O. S. May was then read and upon motion was accepted.

Nomination to fill the vacancy were then declared in order and John Curl and M. Young were Nominated. Upon a ballot being cast it resulted in a tie vote Mayor Myers casting the deciding vote in favor of John Curl.

The McKenzie wagon road across the Cascades, from Prineville to Eugene, is being put in first class order this summer by a force of men who are constantly working upon it. The improvement was much needed and will be appreciated by many settlers.

The Oregon Telephone Company last week began the work of stringing a wire from Salem to Portland on poles set along the county road. The wire is a good big copper one, weighing 170 pounds to the mile, so that it will carry the voice in first class shape. The line will furnish communication with all the towns between Portland and Salem, and it will be ready for business in about five weeks.

The Bohemia mines east of Cottage Grove are attracting considerable attention at present and promise to be the best paying mines in Oregon. Some of the men there have panned out as high as \$25 worth of gold a day. Many claims have been located there recently and the gold fever is spreading. Dr. Oglesby, of Cottage Grove, has quite an interest in the mines and refuses to sell for less than \$50,000. New men are going to the mines every day. Some of the ore taken out assays as high as \$320 to the ton.

At Linkville last week, Tom Miles shot and fatally wounded Josh Buckmaster. The ball entered Buckmaster's body just below the right shoulder and came out through his left breast. Miles exhibited a bullet hole in his hat which he claims was made by a bullet from Buckmaster's weapon. The shooting is the outgrowth of the Shook-Goodlow tragedy, which occurred there about two months ago, and in which the latter was killed. The quarrel arose out of a dispute between the Goodlow and Shook factions concerning the possession of some cattle which Tom Miles and others were rounding up. Buckmaster cannot recover.
