Mr. Eastburn, of the firm of Pretzman & Eastburn butchers of this city, moved his family up from the vicinity of Aumsville the first of the week, and is now occupying one of P. O. Smith's houses.

Last week G. W. Vernon who lives in the Santiam Forks, had his barn and contents burned. It contained his winter supplies, including 30 tons of hay. No insurance. The fire is supposed to be of incendiary origin.

John Gill and family contemplate moving to Southern Oregon next month to spend the winter. They will make the change in the expectation of benefitting the health of their little boy who is troubled with the phthisis.

If our merchants and other business men would inaugurate a system of good roads leading to Scio they would largely augment the volume of trade for our city. Bad roads cause many people to patronize the merchants of other towns, who would come to Scio if the roads were better in winter.

We, this week observed that drummers were having Jefferson teams to come to Scio after them. The question at once arises: What are our liverymen about that they permit such work as that? It would seem that if commercial men sell our merchants goods, they ought in justice, patronize our liverymen and hotels; in fact, we think our merchants should insist upon their doing so.

Senator Mitchell in an interview with an Oregonian reporter, expresses himself strongly in favor of silver, and claims that the demonetizing of silver by our government in 1873, is more responsible for our present hard times, than tariff tinkering. He further stated: "I am unalterably opposed, and always have been, to the single gold standard. I am opposed to a single silver standard, although I have no hesitancy in declaring that in my judgment if we must have in this country a single standard of either, then we would be infinitely more prosperous in every respect—all classes—on the single silver standard than on the single gold standard. If we must be subjected to monometalism in this country, then I would prefer silver monometalism to gold monometalism. But I prefer neither. I prefer bimetalism in the best sense of that term."

Farm Dwelling Burned.

The valuable farm dwelling of F. P. Devaney, Esq., who lives between this city and Jefferson, was totally destroyed by fire on Wednesday morning. As no one was at home at the time, it is not known how the fire originated. The last time that fire had been kindled in the house for the benefit of the family was on the evening previous, and while it is possible that a smoldering spark from this last fire in the cook stove was the cause of the house being burned, it is hardly probable. Two young men who were working near by, first saw the smoke and blaze and saved most of the contents of the two lower front rooms. But so quickly did the flames do their destructive work that there was little time for any one to get there, let alone remove the contents of the building. In three quarters of an hour after the fire was first seen, the building was in ashes. The house was built several years ago, and was a large commodious, well furnished farm house and richly worth the amount of insurance—\$800—that was carried upon it. It was insured in the Sun Insurance company and we are told that the adjusting agent will soon adjust the loss.

Hop Notes.

The most of the yards in this vicinity will have been picked by the close of this week. E. J. Daly got through on Tuesday and was the first to finish. His pickers scattered out to other yards, which had hitherto been shorthanded.

We hear some complaint of mold and lice and quite a good many hops were not picked on that account, yet with this loss a more bountiful yield than that of last year, is reported. In Daly's yard, the yield would have been double that of last year, had these enemies to the hop industry not appeared. Baby yards (first crop) will be in full blast next week.

E. C. Herren of Salem was up the first of the week. He states that the outlook for the price of hops is not encouraging. Six cents per pound was the best offer he could make. Possibly later on he could do better, but he evidently does not expect it.

An extra fine quality is reported from J. M. Bilyeu's yard; also P. L. Bilyeu's are exceptionally fine.

Had our growers been able to realize as good prices this year as last, the crop being so abundant, money would have been quite plenty in the vicinity of Scio this fall. As it is, quite a perceptible difference in the circulation of money over that of a few weeks ago can be noticed. Our merchants are enjoying quite a lucrative trade with the numerous pickers.

Taken to the Asylum.

Last Friday Thomas Large and Deputy Marshal Hagey took George and John Smeltzer over to Albany, where they were given medical examinations to establish whether or not they should be taken to the Asylum at Salem, for treatment.

George showed very plainly his mental derangement, and was duly committed, and taken to Salem on the following day. With John, the case was different. The doctors thought he would be all right in a few days, and was but somewhat overexcited. Scio is getting to be well represented in the Asylum and reform school, but we think it will be many days before she has a representative in the penitentiary.

An Easy Victory.

Some time ago, Henry Myer of this city, was watched to run a 120 yards foot-race, with Frank Lewis of Lebanon. The race occurred at Waterloo last Sunday. Henry said he was a little scared of Lewis till he had scored with him a few times, when he (Henry) became convinced that it was an easy race. The race was for a purse of \$80. But little side money was put up. Lebanon will have to start a faster runner if she in it at all with our Scio sprinters.

The State Fair.

From what we can learn, the present session of the state fair is one of the most successful exhibitions ever given by the society. Every department seems to be well filled with exhibits. The stock pens are unusually well filled, and the entries for the various races indicate that many of the best horses in the northwest will contest for the premiums. Additional attractions in the way of native Indian games and sports, balloon ascensions, bicycle races are on hand every day. On Tuesday the gate receipts were \$3,500, indicating that though times are hard, the fair of 1894 will be a financial success.

Murder and Suicide.

John W. Stengele, a Portland civil engineer, became embittered with the charms of Mrs. Mabel Calvin of Worcester, Mass., who has been stopping in Portland for the past year, for the purpose of obtaining a divorce from her husband. The affection appeared to be mutual, as an engagement of marriage was entered into by them, as soon as the courts had dissolved her existing matrimonial venture. But Mrs. Mabel's ardor cooled somewhat, and she was not averse to receiving the attentions of other gentlemen. This disposition in his lady love was objected to by Stengele, and they were heard quarreling on the street last Saturday evening. On Sunday they met again, within a block of the lady's boarding place, and after a few words, Stengele drew a revolver and fired two shots into the body of his companion, one in the chest and the other in the head; either shot would have been fatal. After he was sure that his bullets had done their deadly work, he placed the pistol to his temple and blew out his own brains. Both victim and murderer moved in the best circles of society and were well thought of.

Killed in a Hopyard.

An accident occurred in Dr. Davis' hopyard last Saturday, which resulted in the death of Miss Malinda Grobe, a girl of about 13 years of age, whose family lives near Creswell, and had come to pick hops. Coroner J. A. Jayne was called and empaneled a jury which developed the following facts: Willie Brownlee a lad of about 12 years, a resident of Eugene, and another boy undertook to chop down a sapling near the tent where Miss Grobe's people were camped, when she ordered them off. Upon their refusal to go, she procured a sprout about six feet long and proceeded to give them a sound thrashing. Willie retaliated by throwing a club which struck the girl behind the ear. She fell unconscious and remained so until death which occurred Sunday morning. A post mortem examination was held with Drs. DuGras and Kelly present. It was found that a blood vessel had burst inside the skull, from which death ensued. A warrant for the arrest of Brownlee has been issued but up to this writing he has not been found.—Herald.

To Test the Salary Law.

Messrs. Kelly & Curl, attorneys for Horace Farwell of this city, have brought a suit which will be a test case to try the legality of the salary law of county officers. The suit is brought against County Clerk Needham to compel him to file the complaint and necessary papers in a civil suit without exacting of the plaintiff the fees in advance, as required by the new law. It is claimed the new law can be shown to be null, and the action is brought to bring the matter to trial. Judge Burnett has issued an order for an alternative mandamus and the case will be heard at the October term of circuit court. The case will probably go to the supreme court for final determination. If the new law is declared null and void and the old law is restored, the clerks and sheriffs of the various counties under the fee system would receive more than under the new law, but the recorders would receive less, as in most of the counties their salaries are more than the fees of the office in most of the counties of the state. There is no ill feeling over this suit, as it is simply brought to test the validity of the new law.—Herald.
