Postmaster Shelton paid a visit to the county seat, Monday.

George Phillips went to Silverton via bicycle Tuesday evening.

Mrs. Grace Gill went to Eugene last Sunday for a month's visit.

W. W. Crawford and family came over from Tallman Saturday and were visiting the Press family over Sunday.

C. W. Penn who has resided with the Press family during the past summer, went over to Tallman last Monday.

J. L. Chapman will sell at public auction on October 23, about 50 head of hogs, 7 head of cattle and 2 head of workhorses.

The Scio Roller Mills company has purchased two car loads of sawed railroad ties, which will be used in making necessary repairs to the Scio Branch railroad.

J. M. Moyer, of Linn county, has kept a strict account of all expenses attending the picking, drying and baling of his 18,000 pounds of hops, and the total cost figures up 31 cents per pound.

Mr. J. T. Marianne, section foreman on the O. C. & E. R. R., with headquarters at Oates, came to Albany yesterday to consult a physician. Several weeks ago he accidentally cut one of his thumbs upon a broken window-light piece of glass, and the wound has refused to heal and is giving him a great deal of pain.

Wm. Pfeiffer is the owner of the most valuable tarrier dog in Oregon. She answers to the name of Roneal and sold in England for \$350. She took the first premium twice at the London dog show and has crossed the ocean four times. Her home will hereafter be in Albany, and it is an interesting spectacle to watch her kill a rat—Telescope.

Mr. Arnold Sommer of this county, has brought suit in the circuit court for Marion county, against Amos Strong, the well known restaurant and mining man, for \$5000 damages. He accuses the defendant of seducing his daughter Anna C. Sommer, aged 20 years on February 23, 1895, and who on January 19, 1896, gave birth to a child. Hons. W. R. Blyeu and H. C. Watson are the attorneys. The case is one that excites general attention on account of the prominence of the defendant.

Republicans themselves did not have very much respect for the Oregonians nephew when he was here to make a campaign speech last Saturday, as quite a number of them that were in town failed to attend. They probably thought an officer in the pay of the state had no right to be absent from his post of duty making partisan campaign speeches, and that it was their duty to manifest their displeasure by absenting themselves therefrom.

Dr. J. F. Hendrick, of Harrisburg, who died Tuesday night Sept. 23, 1896, at 11:30 o'clock, was born in Knoxville, Tenn., May 27, 1830; he studied medicine in New Orleans in 1851; and 1852; and came to the coast in 1853, residing a while in California and British Columbia. He resided in Canyon City three years, then in Lebanon and in 1868 located in Harrisburg where he afterwards resided. He was married in 1867, his wife and one daughter, Mrs. Dr. W. H. Davis, of this city surviving him. He was a man of ability, prominent as a local writer and in politics, and leaves a good record as a citizen.

Mr. Jerry Colwell, of the Oregonian reportorial and editorial staff for a great many years, and a newspaper man from the days of Oregon's infancy, came down from Springfield, Tuesday morning and remained till 4 P. M. in Scio and vicinity. Jerry is an out and out gold bug as might be supposed from his holding a position on the staff of the Oregonian, but for all that is a first-class good fellow, and we thank him for the pleasant call he made the Press while here. By the way we noticed him in close communion with a couple of our successful local hunters, and if Jerry takes a long string of pheasants with him on his return to Portland accompanied with tales of his prowess as a hunter, our Portland friends will make due allowance, for Jerry is an old newspaper man and doubtless has acquired the habits that most pencil shovers have. Come again Jerry, we will always be glad to see you.

Wm J. Bryan a few days ago had made 205 speeches, in 172 towns and cities in 22 states, traveling 5022 miles. Mr. McKinley had made 73. Many of the speeches of Mr. Bryan were two minute remarks on platforms.

Reorganized.

It will be remembered that our creamery patrons held a meeting last week, to take some steps to secure payment for the milk they were supplying, and that a temporary superintendency was placed in the hands of J. A. Blyeu to secure that end. On Thursday October 1, a meeting of the subsidy subscribers was held at the Firemen's Hall in this city, with T. J. Munkers, chairman and T. L. Dugger, secretary. After discussing the creamery affairs informally, but in a pretty thorough manner, it was decided, by motion, that an additional sum of \$350 be raised by such subscribers as felt disposed to furnish the same, for the purpose of paying a note that was held against the plant by the Portland firm from whom it was purchased. When this note was paid, it was also voted that the contract mortgage executed by Mr. Catterlin to the subscribers in the first place, be transferred to such subscribers as would furnish this additional amount, it being understood that this new subscription would be obtained by the original subsidy subscribers increasing their contribution to raise the amount. A new executive committee was selected and empowered to go ahead and carry out the wishes of the subscribers as contemplated, and make arrangements for the successful operations of the plant. Messrs A. J. Johnson, A. C. Gaines and J. A. Blyeu were named as the committee.

On Monday the committee solicited and obtained J. S. Morris as superintendent of the plant, and employed Mr. Catterlin to assist him in operating it. This places the creamery upon a solid basis, and all who furnish milk may rest assured that they will get their money for the milk regularly every month, and get every cent that will be realized over and above what is charged for making the butter. Mr. Morris informs us that he will, in a short time, be able to inform the patrons definitely what he can pay for the milk etc., and desires every one who can to give the creamery their patronage, as he is determined to make it a success and a benefit to every farmer in the community who patronizes it.

Returned to the Orphans Home.

Some time ago a little girl was adopted from the Orphans Home in Portland, by Mr. and Mrs. Jas. M. Morgan of near this city. The action of this fairly aged couple was remarked upon, by various persons in the community, in assuming the care and education of a child so young. By some means Rev. I. F. Tobey, superintendent for the home in Portland became informed of the age of the couple and that they could not care for the little girl as well as was desired, so on Saturday he came up from Portland and on Monday assumed control of the little maid, taking her to Portland on his return. While here he organized an auxiliary advisory board with the following officers: President, Mrs. J. S. Morris; Vice president, Mrs. M. C. Smith; Secretary, Mrs. N. E. Gill; Treasurer, Mrs. M. T. Cole. Any persons desiring to adopt children may apply to this board.

Printing the Ballots.

County Clerk Montague on Thursday opened the bids for printing the ballots, 38,400 for the November election. They were as follows: Glass and Prudhomme, \$54; H. Y. Kirkpatrick, of Lebanon, \$43; Silver Impriet, \$29; C. W. Watts, \$32.64; Smiley the printer, of Albany, \$32.60; Cavender & Brown, of Brownsville, \$30.08. The contract was let to the Silver Impriet, the lowest bidder. The contract calls for 19,200 white ballots and 19,200 colored.

The Republican Rally.

The Republicans of Scio and vicinity attempted to hold a small sized rally, last Saturday afternoon but which was a dismal failure so far as an important political demonstration was concerned. Mr. Johnson in calling the meeting to order apologized for the small size of the audience, stating that the meeting had been but indifferently advertised as bills had been up but for a day or two. After the song "America" had been rendered by a male quartette, Mr. Willis S. Dunnway, private secretary of Governor Lord was introduced.

Mr. Dunnway after complimenting the ladies for being present and the tasteful manner in which the hall had been decorated, launched into his subject in a true campaign style. A good share of his time was taken up in demonstrating the impossibility of the free coinage of silver to annihilate the 16,000 miles that intervenes between this Northwest coast and Liverpool over which the farmer's wheat must be taken, and showed the great benefits that would accrue to the Pacific coast farmer with the building of the Nicaragua canal; that the republican party was in favor of constructing the canal and that the democratic party was opposed to such construction.

The silver question was then given a thorough ventilation from a republican standpoint. He showed, to his own satisfaction at least, that the so-called crime of '73, was not a crime at all but was thoroughly discussed and that there was a great quarrel between the two houses of congress whether we should have a subsidiary dollar or a trade dollar, neither of which was to be legal tender for more than five dollars. He neglected to cite any mention of a standard 412 grain silver dollar that was legal tender for any amount, by either house of congress in the secession, and this neglect of the standard silver dollar is wherein the wrong was committed; so it may be regarded as a fact that the claims of the friends of silver in this respect are substantially correct. Mr. Dunnway did not exactly call people who believed in the free coinage of silver fools, but showed very conclusively that he had but very little respect for their sensibility, though he admitted that they might be honest. His only method of relief from the depression in prices was the building of the Nicaragua canal, and as every one on this coast is in favor of that improvement he could make no mistake by advocating such a plan. His address was no doubt pleasant to the adherents of the gold standard but to every one who leans toward free silver coinage it was objectionable. There was about fifty voters present, two-thirds of whom were Bryan supporters, and quite a number of whom were so offended that they say they will not attend another republican speaking in Scio.

The young couple who have pledged their vows to love and cherish each other as long as life shall last, are well known in this community.

The ceremony, which was a very impressive one, was performed at 10 A. M. The bride wore a cream colored altarpiece dress, trimmed in cream lace, and as the couple appeared on the floor the bride looked handsome and charming enough to satisfy the most fastidious requirements of the proudest young husband. The ceremony was witnessed by the immediate relatives and friends after which an elegant wedding dinner was served. The bride and groom beside receiving the hearty congratulations of all present, received a number of elegant wedding presents. The usual charivari was tendered the happy couple after midnight, and the participants were invited to partake of an elegant lunch to which they did ample justice.

Cases Dismissed.

On Monday, Deputy U. S. marshal, George Humphrey, came over from Albany and proceeded at once to arrest Erank Thorp and Thomas Large Jr. which he succeeded in doing during the afternoon. It was the intention to take the accused at once before Justice Shelton for examination, but as the justice was not in the city the prisoners were held till after 6 p. m. when the examination was had. The complaint, which was sworn to by J. B. Mullan, charged that the accused Frank Thorp and Thomas Large Jr. were guilty of retailing liquor on the premises of Thomas Large with-out having first paid the requisite revenue tax. The witnesses, John Rhoda, J. W. Patterson and Billy Miller Jr. knew nothing at all about the matter, so Justice Shelton dismissed the case.

Fatal Collision.

Early on Tuesday morning two engines collided on the S. P. R. R. between Dillard and Roseburg. The conductor of the overland train (South bound) Fred Wall, forgot some of his tickets at Roseburg, and at Dillard sidetracked the train and started back to Roseburg after them. The tickets had been discovered at Roseburg, and an engine dispatched with them with instructions to overtake the overland at Myrtle Creek. The two engines collided near Greens. On the overland engine were James Porter, engineer; Geo. Happersett, fireman and Ben Lohr, brakeman; on the engine sent to overtake the overland were Bob McCauley, engineer; Jack McGonigle, fireman and J. Toy, brakeman. There was a dense fog that prevented the approaching engines from seeing each other till it was too late to prevent a collision. As a result Fireman McGonigle and Brakeman Toy were killed; Fireman Happersett had both feet mashed, one leg being amputated afterward just below the knee; Engineers McCauley and Porter escaped with sprained ankles. Porters engine after colliding broke loose and ran about two miles. An inquest was held in the afternoon.

A damage suit for \$10,500 has been commenced against the Lawler Mining Company of Anidem, in behalf of Charles J. Bishop, the young man who was so badly injured by the delayed explosion of a blast of giant powder exploding the next day after it was supposed to have been fired with two others by Bishop's working over the place where it was located with a pick. Mr. Bishop lost one eye and was otherwise so badly shaken by the explosion that he had to be taken to Portland for treatment, being laid up there for five months. His attorneys are Cox & Catlin and Teal & Minor, of Portland.
