He is one of the best posted men in the state, and you will be well paid for coming. Speaking will begin at 7:30 P. M. Collis P. Huntington, who is said to have given \$50,000 to the Mark Hanna campaign fund has raised the freight rate in Oregon 1 1/2 cents per bushel on wheat. It is in order for some one to lay that to the certainty of McKinley's election. Yesterday the price of wheat in Albany was quoted at 67 cents, and some choice lots met with even better offers than that. It makes the flagging courage take a firmer stand to see the price crawling back to the old figures.—Tuesday's Herald. A GRAND RALLY.

Perhaps the largest number of people who were ever in Albany to any one day, attended the Bryan rally and "Pitchfork" Tillman speaking in Albany last Saturday.

The crowds commenced to arrive as early as eight o'clock and by ten o'clock delegations from Benton county, Lyons, Lebanon, Sodaville and other points had arrived, and by noon the streets were literally packed by the thousands, all or nearly all of whom wore Bryan, 16 to 1 badges.

Promptly at 1:30 the parade was formed on the public square, headed by the Albany band, two marshals leading the column; speakers in carriages; girls 16 to 1; Ladies band of Corvallis; footmen; Sodaville band; carriages, hacks, etc.; 16 white horses to 1 yellow one and other horsemen including Mark Hanna leading McKinley by a string. The procession required 45 minutes to pass a given point and all told, contained about 1500 persons, about 1100 of whom were voters. The procession moved up and down first street and then to the court house yard where the speaker's stand was erected.

Mayor Burkhardt was the chairman of the day, and introduced the exercises by calling for the singing of "Home, Sweet Home" and "Rally Round the Flag." Colonel Drake was then introduced and spoke for 15 minutes in a happy strain, introducing Senator Tillman.

Senator Tillman prefaced his remarks by stating that he was the largest free advertiser man (evidently alluding to his pitchfork fame) in the United States. He then addressed himself to the silver question, the question at issue, and delivered the most convincing, terse address we have listened to during the campaign. His illustration as to the value of our various kinds of money was very convincing. Should a silver and gold dollar be reduced by fire to metal, the gold could be restored to its former condition because you could take or send it to the mint and have it re-coined; hence the bullion or metal was worth as much after the fire as before. The silver would only be worth its bullion value simply because you could not take or send it to the mint and consequently could not have it re-coined. Should a paper dollar pass through the same process it would be totally destroyed.

The gist of the illustration was to show that it was law, and law only that makes money; in other words the stamp of the government rather than the material from which it is made gives money its value. While we have heard more polished addresses than Senator Tillman delivered, we have rarely heard one that was more convincing or that would appeal more to the minds of the common people. The statement that the senator indulged in abuse of those who oppose him politically, is untrue. The force with which the argument was delivered, coupled with facial expression of the speaker, held the attention of the multitudes, as if riveted, during the entire address.

Without doubt the address coupled with the enormous crowds present will have a market effect upon the voters of Linn county. It was frequently asserted by different ones, that there were enough voters present to carry Linn county by from 1500 to 2000 for Bryan. In the evening there was a monster torch light procession with 600 to 700 torches, all of which were carried by voters. At the Opera house Colonel Drake delivered an eloquent address. J. J. Whitney at the court house and J. S. Morris, Scio, W. A. Cox, Albany, Jno. A. Shaw, Mill City, and J. L. Davidson, Salem, John Miller, Crabtree and hundreds of others.
