Harry Watkins.

As Mr. Watkins is probably the most versatile orator in the valley to-day; you should be sure to hear him. His address will be replete with facts and anecdotes illustrating his arguments. Speaking will begin at 7:30 p. m.

The Moores-Whitney Debate.

Quite a good sized audience assembled at the city hall last Friday to listen to the debate on the current political issues between C. E. Moores, of Salem and J. J. Whitney of Albany. The first arrangement was for Mr. C. S. Spencer, of Portland, to present the gold standard side of the argument, but as he had cancelled his date at Scio, Mr. Moores was substituted by the committee in his stead.

Promptly at 2 p. m. the meeting was called to order and Hon. T. M. Munkers selected chairman and T. L. Dugger and A. J. Johnson time keepers.

Mr. Moores in a speech 1 1/2 hours long opened the debate; giving his attention exclusively to matters pertaining to historical data prior to our civil war. The facts cited are matters of history and which nobody disputes; though they were not stated fully and the conclusions drawn were unfair.

Judge Whitney in a 1 1/2 hours talk presented the "Bryanized" side of the argument. In doing so he gave nearly his entire attention to recent administrations and principally to the present and Mr. Harrison's. As the previous speaker had adduced but very little argument that required to be refuted and the Judge's speech was composed almost entirely of new matter and pertaining to the living present issues. He made a convincing argument which was frequently applauded, and succeeded in making his opponent so mad that he (figuratively) frothed at the mouth. When the speech was finished, Mr. Moores utterly ignored the chairman, and bounced up corklike and sailed into matters red hot. This had the effect of sending quite a large number from the hall, but which made no difference to the speaker, who continued to pour "hot stuff," (in his estimation) into the ranks of the enemy until time was called upon him by Mr. Johnson. Several announcements were now made by Mr. Johnson, among which was that Mr. Moores would speak at night and that we would have songs by the "Singing Evangelist" Mr. Steele, of Albany.

The meeting in the evening was slimly attended, and Mr. Moores devoted nearly the whole of his time to answering the argument of Judge Whitney in the afternoon, and to abusing and belittling the populist or popocratic party. Certainly Judge Whitney's remarks must have reached the goal, else Mr. Moores would not have thought it necessary to devote his harangue in the evening to replying and which disgusted all of the party he was assailing besides some of the republicans. Give us some Moore such speakers and Bryan's majority will be increased.

The Buzz Saw Again.

Tuesday afternoon W. E. Catterlin, of the Scio Creamery, was sawing wood at the creamery and carelessly or otherwise allowed his right hand to come in contact with the saw and as a matter of course the hand got the worst of the scrimmage. Mr. Catterlin went at once to Dr. Prill's office where the hand was dressed. It was found the index finger was severed nearly in two close to the knuckle joint and the third finger badly lacerated. Dr. Prill thinks he will be able to save the finger, though it will hardly ever be as serviceable in shooting China pheasants, as it was formerly.

About Completed.

The finishing touches are being given by the carpenters T. J. Claxton and N. L. Higgins this week, and papering and painting on the inside is about all there is to do now. In appearance and arrangement, Mr. Gill has in the opinion of many, the finest residence structure there is in the city. As Mr. Gill has had the building erected for his own use and family residence, it is his own fault if the structure does not suit him, but which we believe does and reflects credit upon the architect and builder Mr. Claxton. Suffice to say the building would be a credit to any town or city in the county.

The Montgomery Speaking.

Last Saturday evening Mr. J. B. Montgomery delivered a very telling address from a business man's standpoint, to a good audience at the city hall. He showed that the prices of all commodities had shrunk since 1873 in a greater degree than the amount produced would warrant; and that prices rose during the 20 years preceding 1873, nevertheless the percentage of increase in productions was much greater than during the 20 or more years since, and produced reliable data to prove his assertions. This decline in prices he charged directly of the act demonetizing silver in 1873. In an interview, while here, Mr. Montgomery in substance, said: There has not been as much improvement along the line of railroad I built in 1880 from Ray's landing to Brownsville, as I expected. I have not been in your town for 15 years, and I am sorry to see that there has been but very little if any progress since that time. 15 years ago the farmers had plenty of money, the storekeepers were doing a rushing business and the railroads were taxed to their utmost capacity to carry away the farm products and bring in commodities for consumption. Mr. Loughmiller who was a warehouseman at Woodburn in 1880, and now is in the same business at Silverton, in reply to my question asking him what was the matter with the railroads, replied "Oh, they have dried up. Do you know that it (the Woodburn-Springfield railroad) does not do one third the business it did in 1881?" I said, "Is it not because the farm is drying up?" Is it not because in 1891, wheat was worth 90 cents a bushel while it is now worth but half that sum?" Mr. Montgomery believes that the steady fall of values and the shrinkage of the business of all enterprises, will continue to be the rule under the continuance of the single gold standard and that it is but a question of a few short years, if this iniquitous system continues, when the farms in the vicinity of Scio as well as all other portions of the valley, will be worth but one-half what they are now. In other words, if we retain the single gold standard, property has not nearly reached the bottom of the decline yet.
