Professor French, of the Corvallis agricultural college, was one of the leading spirits at the meeting. On Thursday afternoon the institute enjoyed a treat in the shape of an address on "Flax Culture" by Mrs. Lord, wife of Oregon's chief executive, which was greatly enjoyed and listened to attentively.

Scio Public Schools.

The first quarter of the School year closed on Friday, Dec. 11th, 1896. A summary of attendance gives the following figures for the last month:

The high school course was discontinued, and one teacher dismissed. This will compell nine bright, intelligent pupils to seek their education elsewhere. It is understood that the cause of these retrenchments is lack of funds to carry on the work.

The school returns to the position it occupied last year, and an effort will be made to retain the grades of classes intact. This of itself is a matter of great importance.

A nice little program was rendered on Friday afternoon, participated in by the pupils of rooms 1 and 2. Besides the recitations and songs by the pupils, which was interesting, several speeches were made by visiting patrons of the school. School clerk R. Shelton made a neat little speech, expressing his satisfaction with the progress of the School. He was followed by Hon. A. J. Johnson, former member of the board in the same strain. Mr. Dilley followed urging the pupils to make good use of their time. There were many lady visitors and all seemed to have a good time. A similar program will be rendered Dec. 24th, to which all are invited.

He Killed An Ohio Man.

The history of Lou Van Hise, alias James Jones, a penitentiary convict, came to light today. Van Hise is a black sheep of a respectable family in Ohio. When a boy he was indicted for horse-stealing. In 1891, when a man, he killed William T. Cutler, by striking him on the head with a revolver. Cutler was 70 years of age, and was trying to pacify Van Hise, who was in a drunken frenzy. Since the killing of Cutler, Van Hise has been a fugitive from justice. Last September, he and his pal, James Ferrow, were arrested in Portland for burglarizing a store in Turner, Marion county. They were brought to Salem, and at the October term of court both were found guilty, and were sentenced to one year, each, in the penitentiary. While in the Marion county jail, Van Hise told Sheriff Wrightman the story of his crime. The sheriff of Butler county was communicated with, and Van Hise's story corroborated. A reward of \$250 is offered for his conviction by Butler county. He will be returned to the scene of his crime after being released from the Oregon penitentiary. Van Hise is about 35 years of age, has flashing black eyes, and unusually intelligent appearance.

L. O. T. M. Organized.

Miss Rebecca T. Smith, deputy Supreme Commander of L. O. T. M. for the state of Oregon and Mrs. Caterlin of Salem, came up Monday and were engaged for several days in effecting an organization of a lodge of the Ladies of the Macca bees in this city. The organization was effected Wednesday night after a public lecture by Miss Smith.
