LOCAL BRIEVITIES.

The rains of last Saturday and Sunday caused Thomas creek to approach the high water mark for the present winter.

The Legislative Situation.

This week of the usual time of a legislative session sees the situation no nearer a solution than at any time during the session. Sen. Mitchell, knowing the struggle is one of political death to himself, unless he succeeds, seems to be determined to continue the battle to the bitter end, evidently caring not a copper for the future condition of his party in Oregon, or the welfare of the people, in that he is the sole cause of the blocking of all legislation.

Last week the senate discharged all of its committee clerks, evidently not having the gall to keep 67 people upon the state's pay roll with absolutely nothing to do. Had these clerks have not been employed until there was work for them to do, some \$8,000 to \$10,000 would have been saved for the people.

It is rumored that the members who have refused to participate in either rump organization will promulgate a writing in the nature of an ultimatum, which will make the position they have taken plain to the people and place the responsibility of preventing legislation on the shoulders upon which it properly belongs. Whether final adjournment will be taken this week or not, is not indicated by the latest reports. Adjournment, however, will be taken unless there is some sign of breaking away on one side or the other and a prospect that regular legislative action can be had, at once.

favors the passage of a law in Oregon providing a bounty on beet sugar made in the state. While a good deal can be said in opposition to bounties, there is also a good deal to be said in favor of bounties for the development of industries. In the case of the beet sugar business it is, and for some time has been, a well known fact that we can raise sugar beets of an extraordinarily high grade and that the yield averages larger than in most sugar producing countries. It is also a known fact that we consume in the state 20,000,000 pounds of sugar per year, and yet there has been no factory established. If by the payment for a few years of a moderate bounty on the sugar produced in the state we can insure the establishment of an industry which will permanently add millions of dollars yearly to our income it would appear to be a good business proposition to give the bounty.—Portland Agriculturalist.
