Death of Mrs. Ella Morris

On Monday night at 10:20 o'clock occurred the death of Mrs. Sarah Ella Morris at the family home in this city. The immediate cause of her demise was a severe cold contracted some weeks ago and which culminated in a severe attack of pneumonia and lung fever. At first her sickness was looked upon as trivial and but an attack of La Grippe. As time progressed and the disease became fastened upon her vitals, it secured so firm a hold that the best and most constant medical attendance failed to stay the progress of the destroyer.

Miss Sarah Ella Tyler was born July 5, 1863. Was raised to womanhood in the vicinity of Brownsville. She was united in marriage with Joseph N. Morris, on December 24, 1888, at once taking up their residence in Scio, where they continued to live till the time of her death, which occurred as above stated. A husband and little daughter survive her together with one sister and four brothers all of whom, we believe reside in Brownsville and vicinity. Both her parents are dead. The funeral is occurring as we go to press on this, Wednesday, afternoon; the remains being interred at Franklin Butte cemetery.

Elder Cane, of Albany, conducted the funeral services, the pall bearers being supplied from Leonidas Lodge No. 36, K. of P. of which Mr. Morris is a member. The funeral was largely attended. Brownsville Times, please copy.

Hard Times The Cause.

Whether our citizens were influenced to any extent by the Corbett-Fitzsimmons prize ring contest, we are unable to say; but for fighting to commence so soon after the reports of the great fight encounter, makes one a little suspicious. At all events a little unpleasantness occurred, on the South side, early on Saturday morning, that might have had a more serious ending than we now have to chronicle.

Hun W. Bilyeu by some means became indebted to R. D. Calavan. To enforce payment of the debt Mr. Calavan sued out attachment papers on last Friday evening and placed the same upon a wagon and some cattle. On the following morning they met at the saloon and commenced talking in a friendly way about the matter. Becoming somewhat more earnest a quarrel resulted and profane and abusive language. Calavan struck Bilyeu two or three times in the face, scratching and bruising him somewhat, and Bilyeu being much the smaller man, used his pocket knife in return. After the battle was over, Calavan showed a slight gash above the ear but of no consequence while Bilyeu having scratches in the face, showed no bad effects, excepting being being very muddy from the effects of an involuntary bath he had taken in the muddy street.
