City Council.

Council met in regular session on Thursday evening of last week and was called to order by Mayor Ewing. Councilmen Goin, Daniel, Peery and Ray were present, and Barnes, Irvine and Gill absent. Reports of the city treasurer and recorder read and referred to appropriate committees. Councilman J. R. Gill tendered his resignation as councilman. Resignation accepted and R. E. Hagey \$50 for two months salary, read and ordered paid. L. A. Muncker was ordered paid \$15 for three months salary as marshal. Bill of 40 cents for repairing cross walk by Marshal Muncker referred.

Ordinance no 42 relating to dogs running at large, read 1st, 2nd and 3rd times and passed. Ordinance committee was instructed to confer with the Scio Police in relation to having city charter and ordinances printed in book form.

Committee on streets was instructed to confer with road supervisors relative to road work due from citizens of this city. Adjourned.
