## THE DOMINANT ISSUE

### SILVER REPUBLICANS MAKE THEIR PURPOSE CLEAR.

They Will Continue to Co-operate with the Organized Forces of Bimetallism.—Their Energies to Be Devoted to the Remonetization of Silver.

For "Silver First and Last." If the address of Senator Teller and the other bimetallic seceders from the popular Republican organization went out to the country on Washington's birthday can be taken as an index of the future course of the silver Republicans is not difficult to guess, as the Kansas City Times. They will organize a provisional national committee, sending delegates to Chicago from every State and Territory, in June. This will provide for the calling of a national convention of the silver party at some time in the future which shall define the measures by which the voters who have gone to the remonetization of silver as the paramount issue before the country, and who are not active members of other organizations, shall be guided.

The silver leaders make it plain that there is to be no formal amalgamation with either the Democratic or the Populist party, for the present at least.

It is their expressed intention that a separate organization should be maintained. They make it equally plain that those Republicans who believe that bimetallism is the panacea issue will not be called upon to surrender their convictions of certain other tenets of Governmental policy and political economy, but will only be asked to keep them in abeyance. This is clearly set forth in the language of the address, where it says: "They realize that those principles are not capable of successful application under present monetary conditions. They believe therefore that the adequate treatment of all other issues must await the correct decision of the dominant one thus presented. In the spirit they co-operated with the organized forces of bimetallism in the last campaign. Every condition of patriotism and expediency seems to counsel a continued campaign of education after the crushing defeat administered to McKinley a few years ago."

This declaration embodying the future course of the Republican wing of the bimetallic forces is unequivocal. No minor issue is to be permitted to distract and divide them in their allegiance to silver remonetization. They will know this as the central and exclusive idea of their future course. In the future, as in the past, they will remain united and organized, ready when the time comes to give solid adhesion and support to whatever party or combination of parties offers the best opportunity to emancipate silver from its long and painful bondage.

Since the election the gold standard organzine have been a unit in declaring that the result was a deathblow to free coinage of silver and unanimously declared that it was wrong to wrestle with a corpse. Free silver was not killed by defeat last November any more than protection was killed four years ago last November. The very organzine that are demanding that free silver be relegated to the rear because it was defeated are the ones that howled loudest about a continued campaign of education after the crushing defeat administered to McKinley a few years ago.

**Republican Reasoning.** When it was announced that the war for free coinage of silver at the ratio of 16 to 1 was to be kept up by an organization of forces, with headquarters at Washington, the gold standard press swept a clean place on the political floor and proceeded to thrash a few Sts. The action of the bimetallics was denounced as an effort to delay the coming of prosperity, a alliance mine owners' propaganda, agitation, promotion of national disorder and such like. The gold standard advocates declared that the campaign ended the free silver "case" and demanded that nothing be done to keep up political agitation.

But while the gold standard press was occupying a great deal of space with their demands and denunciations Marcus A. Hanna and his committee were preparing to continue the Republican organization with the avowed intention of keeping up a campaign of education during the ensuing four years.

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
