Graduating Exercises.

The graduating exercises of the
Scio public schools occurred at the
M. E. church in this city on last
Saturday evening, attended by as
many people as could get into the
building. The stage or rostrum
was tastefully decorated with ever-
green, myrtle and flowers. A ban-
ner suspended across the room bore
the class motto in snowy white let-
ters, "Our work has just begun." At
the rear of the rostrum hung
several pictures enveloped in the
folds of "Old Glory," while in the
front was a large ever green arch,
under which the speakers or singers
stood while rendering that part of
the programme to which they had
been assigned.

Prior to the commencement of the
exercises the Citizens Band rendered
concert at the front of the
building, which to us sounded quite
creditable. After invocation and a
organ voluntary by Mrs. Iva Al-
bert, the first speaker of the gradua-
ting class, Miss Edith Luckenbach,
was introduced as salutatorian, with
an oration on the subject "Life is
what we make it." After whom
the audience in a very neat and
appropriate manner, she addressed
herself to her subject, uttering some
very practical and instructive
thoughts. The oration throughout
showed much thought and prepara-
tion, showing the speaker to possess
quite an analytical mind. Her il-
lustrations were all drawn from the
practical lives of Americans of
prominence and success. Many
beautiful bouquets were presented
the speaker upon taking her seat.

Essay, "Rain and its uses"—Miss
Lora X. Powell. In giving the con-
sistent gaseous elements of water
and the process by which moisture
or vapor rises from the earth and
is converted into rain by becoming
condensed by cooler strata of air,
the young lady showed a thorough
understanding of her subject. She
then drew a picture of what would
be the probable condition of the
earth should the water all disap-
pear; she then pointed out the im-
mense benefits that the navigable
streams, lakes, oceans, etc., have
been to mankind in becoming the
medium upon which boats and
ships are carried. She then told of
the great value that water was to
us in turning the wheels of industry
either by steam or by weight and
force of the water. At the conclu-
sion of the reading the usual num-
ber of bouquets were presented.

A vocal solo "School Bells" by
Mrs. Janie Goff was well received.
"Class History" was the subject
chosen by Miss Sylvia Munkers as
an essay and which was delivered
with considerable distinctness and
energy. The speaker showed the
difference between an ordinary es-
say and a historical sketch. She
then gave a brief autobiographical
sketch of each member of the class,
and predicted flattering futures for
each member. Numerous bouquets
and a ship loaded with flowers was
presented the class historian.

Oration "The American Indian"—
Ira Abbott. After paying quite a
tribute to the Indian and his char-
acteristics, he showed that the red
man was in adopting the ways of
civilization losing all that has made
the Indian great in history and
as an Indian he was slowly but
surely passing away.

Music, vocal solo—Miss Mona Dan-
iel, was nicely rendered and won for
the singer bouquets.

Class prophecy by Miss Nelly P.
Morrow took the nature of a dream;
and allotted to each member of
the class his or her life work.
She made a U. S. senator of Edward
Myers; a lawyer of Miss Edith Luck-
enbach; a teacher, preacher and
missionary of Miss Lora Powell,
predicting that she would be the
old maid of the class; an inventor of
Ira Abbott and an actress of Miss
Sylvia Munkers. Bouquets again
were in order.

Valedictory and oration, by Ed-
ward Myers. After paying quite a
tribute to his teacher, he addressed
himself to his subject "The value
of an Education," showing that the
most valuable reserve capital that
one can have, when starting in life,
is a good education. Then turning
to his classmates after citing the
many pleasures of their school lives,
he bade classmates, teacher and
audience farewell and good night.

The Scio Male Quartette rendered
Annie Laurie, after which superin-
tendent Wheeler was introduced
and who delivered a very practical
and forceful lecture on the influence
and value of the common schools
and education in general, closing
his remarks with some very ap-
propriate advice to the graduating
class.

Diplomas were then awarded, and
the exercises were brought to a
close with a good night song by the
Male Quartette.

The young lady members of the
class deserve special mention for
the neat and tasty manner in which
they were costumed. Taken all to-
gether the graduating exercises of
the Scio public schools are such that
we all take some degree of pride in

They Are Coming.

The tide has started towards Linn
county. Last evening Dr. A. E.
Hinz and Mr. M. A. Lang, of Min-
neapolis, representing the St.
Nichols Colony Co., filed with the
First National bank contracts and
deeds in escrow for the three big
farms of H. Shelton, Thos. Pitchford
and estate of Wm. Cyrus, on the
Crabtree just above Richardson's
gap, about four miles from Scio,
in one of the prettiest valleys in
Oregon. This property was select-
ed after visiting many important
points in Oregon and suited the
men the best. It consists of 594.65
acres of Harvey Shelton's farm, 484
acres of the Thos. Pitchford farm
and about 1200 acres of the Wm.
Cyrus farm, 2470 acres in all, and
will cost about \$35,000 in all. Dr.
Hinz left to-day for Minneapolis
and Mr. Lang for the Crabtree val-
ley with a surveyor to plat the prop-
erty. It will be cut up into tracts
of only 15 acres arranged so the four
houses and gardens will come to-
gether at the intersection. The colony
will consist of Hungarians,
Austrians, ethnics, and over one
hundred families, representing
about five hundred people from
Minnesota and adjoining states
have already agreed to come. Dr.
Hinz says that eventually 800 to
1000 families will locate in the same
vicinity. Forty or fifty of the young
men will come this fall and plow the
entire section deep. They will be
followed in the spring by others and
their families and during the year,
mostly in groups. These people are
thrifty, economical, a family doing
wonders on a small tract. Of course
they raise no wheat, at least only
enough for their own use; but will
make a specialty of hops, prunes
and berries. Messrs. Hinz and
Lang were greatly impressed and
only with the land and its surround-
ings, but as well with our splendid
transportation facilities and cheap
taxes.—Thursday's Democrat.
