Owing to the fact that there is not enough of available work in this locality, to put the road in a passable condition, the county court should give some aid in repairing the road. Tom Holt has solicited 150 days work from people living outside the district to apply simply to have a passable road to Albany at all seasons.

We recently received the premium list of the Oregon State Fair for 1897 together with a complimentary ticket for the season. The management appear to have made unusual exertions to make this year fair a success. The racing program and premiums for stock exhibits are fully up to the standard if not superior to that of former years.

The Oregonian says: Mr. William B. Lawler, manager of the Lawler gold mines, who is now in London, will return shortly, accompanied by Mrs. Lawler. In a letter received from him yesterday, it is learned that the company he represented in operating mines in the Quartzville district has been entirely reorganized, and he will soon return to take personal charge of the work, to be carried on at Antwerp. The Southern Pacific company has decided to put on a special daylight train from Portland to San Francisco for the Christian Endeavor meeting. This train will leave Portland at 5 o'clock on the morning of July 16, and stop at all points north of Ashland. There the train will stop over night and continue on the way to San Francisco the next morning, reaching the latter city on the evening of July 16th. This will be an excellent chance to see all of Western Oregon and the Sacramento Valley of California by daylight. Doubtless many of the citizens of Oregon will take advantage of this opportunity to take a daylight trip through Oregon and California.
