Mother McKinley Dared.

Last Tuesday, in the presence of
sorrowing relatives and sympathiz-
ing friends of the deceased, all that
was mortal of Mrs. Nancy Allison
McKinley, mother of the president
of the United States, was laid to rest
at Canton, Ohio, with befitting cere-
monies.

The services at the McKinley
homestead were private, being at-
tended only by relatives of the fam-
ily and intimate friends, including
the members of the cabinet with
their wives, who had come from
Washington. After the conclusion
of this service the casket containing
Mother McKinley's remains was
taken to the church escorted by a
cortege of vast length, and here the
public services were held.

For the Fourth Time

Theodore Durrant, the condemned
murderer of Blanche Lamont, was
sentenced last Wednesday, by Judge
Bahrs for the fourth time to suffer
the extreme penalty of the law, the
date of his execution being set for
January 7, next.

Durrant was in court, and carried
himself with his customary coolness.
Mrs. Durrant visited her son yes-
terday. Both were downcast, and
seemed to realize that the end was
near.

At Last.

Important developments have
taken place in the affairs of the O. C.
& E. Railroad Company. Articles
of incorporation were filed yesterday
simultaneously in the Linn County
clerk's office and in the office of
the secretary of state, incorporating
the Corvallis & Eastern Railroad
Company. The capital stock of the
new company is \$2,000,000, and its
principal office is Albany. The ob-
jects as set forth in the articles of
incorporation are the operation and
construction of a railroad line from
Yaguia bay to Snake river, near
Ontario, in Malheur county, Oregon,
along the route originally proposed
by the old Oregon Pacific Company,
also the construction of a branch line
from a point near Prineville south-
ward through Lake and other south-
eastern countries to the California
line.—Albany Herald.

He Was an Actor.

On Friday of last week a deaf
mute came to Scio from Albany
prairie, so he said, where he had
been hunting work. He said his
family lived on McCully Mountain,
near Lyons. He said they were des-
titute, having nothing to eat, and
not enough clothes to keep them
comfortable. He had a black eye,
which, however, he took considera-
ble pains to go through the con-
tortions necessary to show that he
received the blow while chopping
wood, and not while fighting. He
was almost froze, and looked be-
drugged and hungry.

As soon as he could make himself
understood, he told the crowd which
had gathered around him, that he
had two small children, which he
could not bear to see suffer, and he
had to have help or they would
starve. He soon had the sympathy
of the crowd, and five or six dollars
was made up for him in a matter
of minutes. Two hundred pounds of
flour was subscribed for him, besides
meat and articles of clothing for
himself and family. He cried pitifully
and was deeply touched.

It was noticed, however, that
when A. J. Johnson and T. J. Mun-
kers gave him a dollar a piece, that
he pointed to the heavens above, as
straight as the Goddess of Liberty,
and when others only gave half a
dollar, he only pointed to Heaven
at an angle of about 45 degrees, and
for a quarter of a dollar he would
not point at all, but slap the giver
on the back, and make that noise
peculiar to deaf mutes.

He took a part of his plunder and
got out of town immediately, seem-
ingly very anxious about his family,
saying he would come back after the
flour, meat, etc.

After he had gone, somebody
made the remark that he had a
trade, at which, he was a skilled ar-
tist, but nobody could remember
what he said his trade was.

The next day he was drunk as a
lord up at Lyons, taking a Thank-
sgiving (which he probably had
not celebrated) Christmas and New
Year, all at once. After the people
who had helped him heard of his
proceedings, they knew he was
an actor, for one thing, and one of
the first water, at that.

On Tuesday of this week, Mrs.
Alice Hartley, who killed Senator
Foley at Reno several years ago
created a great deal of excitement
in Emanuel Baptist church.

as is generally expected, and de-
clared that he will eventually go free.
Gibson, who was Durrant's pastor
refused to see the condemned man's
mother when she called with a mes-
sage from her son asking the
preacher to tell all he knew about
the murders in Emanuel church.

A. Livingstone of Carson, Nev.,
