Durrant Hangs Today.

Durrant has returned the scene of his own death. At his own request, made absolutely without emotion he has been held every incident that will move the minutes of his life hours of fate. From the moment that he awakens Friday morning until Warden Hale gives the signal to spring the gallows trap, Durrant knows what he is expected to do.

A book and several papers on religious subjects were received at the prison Tuesday for Durrant. They were offerings from a woman who resides in Toronto. She was a religious and pious woman, and she has displayed an interest in Durrant's affairs since his arrest for the murder of Blanche Lambert, Deputy Warden Hale made a thorough inspection of the book and papers, and then permitted Durrant to have them.

The authorities suspect that some of Durrant's legal advisers may attempt some play at the very moment that Durrant is to be hanged. In the view of the 20 people who will be present, but Warden Hale will receive the list, so it is unlikely that any of his attorneys will be permitted to be at the gallows.

The condemned man has made the following requests: First that he be allowed to hang in the place of his own death; second, that none of the spectators shall be allowed to gaze upon his features after he is executed; third, that no autopsy shall be made; and fourth, that no physician be allowed to examine his body; fourth, that after he is pronounced dead his remains shall be delivered to his parents as soon as possible.

Wednesday morning Henry French of Jefferson, was arrested on a charge of larceny. He was subsequently liberated, it being found that he was innocent and that his brother and a companion were the guilty parties.

The crime committed in forging the name of Otto Shultz, proprietor of the Jefferson Banking Mills, to a check for \$10 and cashing the same at the bank of J. W. Chishick & Co.

In his monthly statement of the bank Mr. Shultz discovered the check for \$10, cashed by Henry French, was forged. He at once notified the bank and French was arrested and brought to Albany.

It was found, however, that he was not the guilty party, but had no connection with the crime, but that his brother, Louis French, cashed the check and forged the check, and endorsed his brother's name upon the back of the check.

He was accompanied by James Miller, a convict, and the two were brought, ostensibly as witnesses, and were soon arrested for the crime. Louis French and his brother were found to be connected with the writing on the forged check and he and Miller were sentenced to the penitentiary for one year.

They were both held in jail to await preliminary examination at Marshall.
