Local Brevities.

Henry Myers and Fred Morris go to Alaska on the next steamer, Otto Martin, Wm. Savage and Wm. Ehler left to go on the Elder, which sailed from Portland today, but they may not be able to get berths for this trip, in which case they will go on the following steamer. Ed Gilkey leaves for Skagway on the Elder today having secured his ticket some time ago.

O. T. Porter, who was at one time United States Marshal of Alaska, will in a few days begin the publication of a paper in Albany, to be known as the Linn County Republican. J. M. Somers, a member of the last legislature, will be associated with him. The Albany Democrat says it does not know what position Mr. Porter will take, but he is well known to be one of Mr. Mitchell's friends and supporters.

Mark Hanna Elected. The bitter Senatorial contest is ended, and Marcus A. Hanna has been elected senator for both the long and short terms by the senate and house of the state legislature in joint session assembled.

Senator Hanna received 73 votes, a majority of one over the combined strength of the opposition. McKissoon received 69 votes for the short term and 70 for the long term. One representative, Cramer, was absent during the voting on account of illness.

After Hanna was declared elected senator for the long term pandemonium reigned supreme in the hall of the house. A motion made by Senator Alexander was unanimously carried, and a committee of five was appointed to escort Mr. Hanna into the hall.

A Populist Meeting at Albany. A meeting of the populist central committee was held in Albany last Wednesday. Populists generally participated in the discussion of the question of fusion.

From all accounts there was a divided opinion on the subject. After much discussion a resolution was adopted declaring it to be the sense of the meeting that the populists should nominate a ticket of their own, but should divide the county offices with the free silver democrats if they would agree to come over to their political camp.

H. C. Watson was indorsed for circuit judge of this district. It is understood the program is to renominate Judge N. L. Butler, of Polk county, for the other judge and renominate Sam Hayden for district attorney, and try to induce all the free silver, flat money followers to help defeat the common enemy.

Judge Barton, Smith and others seem think they have the game well in hand.

Experiment Successful. Successful telephonic communication was last week established between the lake submarine boat Argonaut and points in Baltimore and Washington. Everything worked admirably. The voice from the waters could be heard as plainly as though the person you were conversing with was at your side.

The Argonaut was submerged at her dock. About 100 feet of cable were attached to an ordinary telephone on the vessel. While the Argonaut was under the water those aboard were in direct communication with several points in both Baltimore and Washington. It is probable that when the batteries aboard the vessel are further tested, longer distance "phoning" will be tried. Mr. Lake will give New York a call from the river.

With this arrangement it now has on board the Argonaut could go into any harbor, or within reasonable distance of any telephone line, and form a connection, such as it has in Baltimore, with the community at large.

Last of Durrant

Theodore Durrant's last request was complied with. His body was cremated. It was taken to Los Angeles Tuesday night and then removed to Pasadena for final disposition.

The corpse was taken from the Durranthome at daylight Tuesday morning and taken to the undertaking rooms of Porter & White, on Edly street, and there placed in a metallic casket. Mr. Thrasher and another friend of the family guarded the remains all day. Mrs. Durrant was in great fear of body-thieves and relic hunters, and all precautions were taken to prevent the stealing of the corpse. Mr. and Mrs. Durrant accompanied the body to the crematory and will return to San Francisco at the end of the week with the ashes. Porter and White sealed the corpse and made it ready for the flames. They had charge of it until it reached Los Angeles. Then the Los Angeles undertakers conveyed it to Pasadena. The body reached Los Angeles at 2 P. M. Wednesday and was taken at once to the crematory.
