W S has a cow which has warts all over her body. All the warts Advertising rates at fair, living rates, to be that have necks to them, tie a small cord tight around; if the wart does not come off in a week, tie on another cord. When it does come off touch the raw surface with a little terchloride of artimony every second day for a week to destroy the root of the wart. The warts which have no necks are flat, scrape off the top and apply a little of the antiomny every second day until the part is lower than the surrounding skin. Then mix 1 oz oxide of zinc in 2 oz yaseline and rub on a little once a

I have had best success with a mixture of one part of sulphur to two parts of sifted air-slaked lime thoroughly mixed. Apply liberally and the cattle will not be hurt.
