"INJUNS."

Billy Nolan, the well-known Indian Interpreter, is heading a movement in Spokane to organize several companies of Indian troops to enlist in the United States army. In the event of war with Spain, from the tribes of the Spokes, Colville and Nepelem Indians Nolan says there is good material for at least three companies of 60 men each. The Indians, he says, are eager for the fray, and are anxious to enlist. John Alexander and Louis Savy, two full-blooded Spokes, have previously each served a number of years with the Indian troops in the United States army, and are well up in the tactics, as is also Jim Andrews, chief of the Indian police on the Colville reservation. These three are now busily engaged in recruiting companies from among the tribes mentioned, and in a few days will be ready to offer their services to Uncle Sam.

War News At A Standstill.

But War Almost Certain.

Washington, April 14.—The action of the house yesterday in adoption of the Cuban resolution made the senate today the storm center of the war elements. The galleries were packed and thousands were turned away.

A message was received from the house transmitting to the senate the Cuban resolution passed by the house by unanimous consent.

Turner ridiculed the diplomatic negotiations of the administration, and declared with bitter sarcasm that with such diplomatic agents as we have representing the United States, the Madrid government might eventually, for a suitable indemnity, absolve this country for blocking the harbor of Havana with the shattered hulk of the Maine.

Hear followed Turner. He said this was no time for impassioned rhetoric, and manifestations of approval greeted the sentiment. He said that Turner, who represented only one state, was making McKinley, who represented 45 states, the subject of the same kind of oburgations that were inflicted upon Washington. Hear thought the Maine affair was enough to justify war.

Turpie followed Hear with a speech for recognition of the Cuban republic.

Bromwell, of Ohio, and other republicans of the house, after visiting their colleagues at the other end of the capitol to day, came back jubilant over the prospect that the senate would be held in continuous session until a vote was taken. Bromwell says he believes a motion to accept the senate resolutions will prevail in the house by a large majority.

Bad Accident at Sodaville.

Prof. Geddes sends the following to the Albany Herald.

Prof. Morton instructor in Creek and Science was thrown from his bicycle on Tuesday the 7th inst. and badly injured. I write a few facts in the case as I do not wish any distorted statements to circulate.

Prof. Morton was riding on the side walk from the college and "took a header," struck on his right temple and right shoulder.

He was completely stunned and unable to move. My boy Alfred Geddes and Prof. Emma Hart were near by and gave the alarm. He was carried to the ladies' dormitory totally unconscious and returning consciousness did not exhibit itself for 20 hrs. He did not give an intelligent answer to questions for 60 hrs. My wife gave him stimulants until the doctor arrived and probably saved his life as he was to all appearances dead.

Dr. D M Jones was called and took active steps to accelerate the circulation and arouse the deadened nervous system.

General Lee.

Crowds Greet him all the way to Washington.

Consul General Fitzhugh Lee arrived at Washington from Havana on Tuesday afternoon. A large crowd of enthusiastic admirers had gathered at the Pennsylvania station, and when the general stepped from the train he was greeted with a tremendous outburst of applause. Women waving their handkerchiefs and men their hats, and altogether the demonstration was a notable one. Washington crowds, as a rule, are not demonstrative, but this occasion was a conspicuous exception.

By the time he was ready to alight the crowd was so dense about the train that even with the assistance of a platoon of police it was with difficulty that he reached the platform. Several friends of the general, among them a number of ladies, pressed forward and finally succeeded in grasping him by the hand. One of the ladies presented a bouquet of roses tied together by ribbons of the national colors, and bearing a tiny Confederate battle flag. Immediately, the crowd began to cheer, and round after round of applause greeted him as he walked slowly and uncovered down the long platform of the station. On reaching the B-street entrance, General Lee entered a state department carriage and was rapidly driven up the avenue to the state department.

The general has not perceptibly changed in appearance since he was last in Washington. His eye is as bright and his step as elastic as ever, and nothing in his manner indicates that there has been anything unusual in his experience during the last several months. How long he will remain in Washington is not known, but it is assumed that he will make his wishes conform to those of the present as to the length of his stay.

Waterloo Woolen Mills Burned.

News was received in Albany last Sunday evening that on Saturday afternoon the woolen mills at Waterloo had been totally destroyed by fire, practically wiping out the town, and taking from Lin Co. county one of its most important industrial plants.

Mr. Thomas Kay had been at the mills looking after the business and had arrived in Lebanon just ready to take the train on his way to Albany, when a messenger came in to inform him of the disaster and he turned back.

The fire originated in the engine room and was so far under head way when discovered as to be uncontrollable, and spread from the mills to the hotel. The messenger said the mills were in ruins and the hotel was falling in when he left and that several other buildings would go.

The loss will probably be \$50,000. The amount of insurance carried is not known. Some time ago the amount on the mills was about \$20,000.

The principal owners of the mill were Mr. Kay, Hon. J. K. Weatherford, J. M. Wallace, Dr. Jessup, C. P. Bishop and Squire Farrer. The hotel is owned by Mr. Kay and Mr. Weatherford and is run by A. P. Howe.

Dragged by the Cars.

Paul Price, a sixteen year old boy residing in the eastern part of the city, boarded the train from Corvallis this morning on the bridge and rode to 4th street where he attempted to jump off, but his foot caught in the step, and he was dragged with his head down for a couple blocks when the train stopped at the usual place before passing the S. P. crossing. He was picked up in an insensible condition and taken to his home and Dr. Davis sent for. There is a partial concussion of the brain, but it is thought to be not so serious but what he will recover. He has been insensible since the accident.
