LATEST FROM THE WAR

As the Dispatches Gave It From Day to Day.

April 27

The monitor Terror made a capture off the coast of Cardenas, Cuba, last night, which, while not as rich as that made by the little Mangrove yesterday, is still valuable enough to bring joy to the hearts of the officers and crew of the Terror. The prize is the Spanish coasting steamer, Ambrosia Bolivar. The cruiser Detroit came into port this morning towing the Spanards, which had been turned over to her by the Terror.

Upon being searched after arriving shore the Ambrosia Bolivar was found to have on board \$60,000 in silver, which, of course, greatly increases the value of the capture. Particulars of the capture of the Ambrosia Bolivar have not yet been given out.

The large Spanish steamer Guido, bound from Coruna for Havana with a large cargo of provisions and money for the Spanish, troops, was captured early yesterday by the United States monitor Terror.

The captured money is in an iron safe, and the amount is not known. The Guido is one of the richest prizes yet captured. It is estimated that with her cargo she is worth nearly \$300,000.

April 28.

The New York, the Puritan and the Cincinnati bombarded the forts at the mouth of Matanzas harbor this afternoon. There were no casualties on our side, but it is believed that the ball of iron which pounded in the forts must have caused loss of life to the Spaniards, though nothing is known definitely.

The engagement commenced at 12:57, and ceased at 1:12. The object of the attack was to prevent the completion of the earthworks at Punta Gorda.

A battery on the eastward arm of the bay opened fire on the flagship, and this was also shelled.

About 12 8-inch shells were fired from the eastern forts, but all fell short.

About five or six light shells were fired from the half-completed battery. Two of these whizzed over the New York, and the others fell short. The ships left the bay for the open sea, the object of discovering the whereabouts of the batteries having been accomplished.

In the neighborhood of 300 shots were put on land from the three vessels from a range of from 3000 to 7000 yards.

Rear-Admiral Sampson, when asked if he was satisfied with the result, said: "Yes, I am. I expected to be."

The half-completed Spanish earthworks and battery were apparently blown up by the shells.

All the ships engaged showed excellent marksmanship throughout the engagement, and when they were firing at the shortest range, nearly every shell took effect.

The universal cry of horse dealers at the east is, "where are we going to get horses?" This is no trick of the trade. It is a genuine lamentation, says the Rider and Driver. The horse census shows a decrease in the last year of 15,000 head. This taken with the fact that only about forty per cent of the brood mares in the country were bred last year and that the chances for this season so far are not showing much improvement, gives ample ground for the dealers' lament. Horses cannot be created off hand. Several years must elapse before the supply can be materially increased; that is first-class, marketable horses.
