Fitzsimmons.

Bob Fitzsimmons has announced his acceptance of the offer of Kid McCoy to pay the champion \$10,000 for a fight at middle-weight; also his acceptance of the offer of Corbett of \$25,000 for an opportunity to regain the heavy-weight championship. Fitzsimmons will meet either man before the club offering the largest purse, but he will insist on a side bet of \$10,000 in each case, and both matches must take place before the last of September, this year.

Corbett After Him.

After reading the Associated Press dispatch from Boston announcing that Fitzsimmons had accepted his offer of \$25,000 for an opportunity to regain the heavy-weight championship Corbett sent the following dispatch to W. A. Brady, his manager, who is in New York:

"Go after that man (Fitzsimmons), and make my offer to him again—\$25,000 that I will stop in 10 rounds and put up some money. Show him up."

"Fitzsimmons says he will accept my offer of \$25,000 for a chance to fight him," said Corbett. "That's not my offer at all. I say I will bet \$25,000 I can stop him in 10 rounds, and I can do it. He is just trying to get out of it. That shows what a coward he is. If Fitzsimmons will put up some money, I will be in New York inside of two weeks to make the match. I'll go anyway. As soon as I leave here next Sunday I will go right to New York and hunt him up."

A special to the News from Nogales, Ariz., says: Word was received from Fort Huachuca that 100 Indians, composed of Apaches, Papagos and Yaquis, had banded together and were moving in the direction of Nogales. The citizens' home guard and company G, of the Arizona militia, were immediately notified. The streets were patrolled all night, and guards were stationed on the surrounding hills to give warning of the approach of the Indians. No disturbance occurred, but a sharp lookout will be kept day and night. Another company of home guards will patrol the streets to prevent a surprise similar to the Yavai outbreak which occurred a few years ago.

LATEST FROM THE WAR

As the Dispatches Gave It From Day to Day.

Hurrah For Dewey.

In an engagement in Cardeas harbor Wednesday afternoon between the United States torpedo boat Winslow and the gunboats Wilmington and Hudson on one side and some Spanish gunboats reinforced by land batteries on the other, the Winslow was badly damaged, one officer and four sailors were killed, and the captain and five men were wounded. The other American vessels engaged were not damaged.

A dispatch to the Globe from Gibraltar says a British steamer just arrived there reports officially that she passed a Spanish torpedo-blast destroyer yesterday which was guarding the straits. Shortly after the steamer passed her all the lights of the destroyer were suddenly extinguished, a terrific explosion disappeared. The disaster was apparently caused by an explosion of her boilers. It is believed all on board perished.

If Spain desires to send a fleet to the Philippines to attack Commodore Dewey's forces, she is at perfect liberty to send it through the Suez canal, according to a statement made by a high official of the state department. "Of course," he continued, the serious question of coal supply would greatly harass her, but Spain cannot afford to send her warships so far away. The Americans would undoubtedly at once attack the Canaries and perhaps Spain itself.

Eight hundred Spanish soldiers have died in Cuba during the past week of neglect disease and hunger.

A special to the World from Tampa says:

A telegram from General Laeet, received tonight, gives the information that Major Smith, who on April 24 landed at Calibacoon to escort a party of newspaper correspondents to General Gomez's camp, has been captured by Spaniards and killed.

The message was signed by a Cuban officer named Lorenz. He has been with captain Dorst, of the Fourth cavalry, who, with two other officers, was sent by General Miles to confer with the insurgents. Captain Dorst reached America today and is due in Tampa late tonight, en route to Washington, where he will lay before the president and his advisers the information he gained.

The telegram regarding Smith is brief. It simply says that when his captors discovered his identity and nationality they beheaded him. The news is regarded as authentic.

Nothing is said of the fate of the newspaper men accompanying him.

A fresh example of Spanish treachery seems to have come to light. It is said here that priests and sisters of charity of Cavite hospital, in a procession, bearing crosses etc., petitioned Admiral Dewey not to massacre the sick and wounded, which naturally he did not do. The Spaniards, it is asserted, thereupon thanked the Americans for their humanity and repaid them by informing them of a narrow channel they explained, was not mined. Investigation on the part of the Americans revealed the contrary to be the case, and the mines were blown up by the sailors of the American fleet.

Admiral Montojo is reported to have been killed by the populace after having escaped from Cavite.

It is asserted that Admiral Dewey finds the insurgents at the Philippines growing dangerous. He cannot control them, nor can he enable the Spaniards to do so. Massacres are said to have occurred outside Manila, the insurgents killing Spanish women and children.
