Mr. H. West of Scappoose has a
two-year-old heifer that promises to
make the champion cow of Oregon.
She calved about the first of March
and is now giving about 34 pounds
of milk per day and the milk tests
five per cent butter fat. She is not
receiving extra care nor unusual feed
and it is altogether probable that she
will give 400 pounds of butter for
her first year. Mr. West is to be
congratulated on his success in
breeding so valuable an animal.
For a number of years he has been
carefully breeding his herd on scien-
tific principles with a view to the
development of butter-producing
capacity, and he is securing the re-
sults for which he has been work-
ing.—Rural Spirit.

LATEST FROM THE WAR

As the Dispatches Gave It
From Day to Day.

Hurrah For Dewey

May 3.

A World dispatch from London

says: England has been staggered by
Commodore Dewey's overwhelm-
ing victory. The superiority of the
United States squadron was re-
cognized, but it was fully believed
that it would have been more than
counterbalanced by the assistance
afforded the Spanish fleet by the sub-
marine mines and the powerful
shore batteries. The splendid seam-
anship and valor of Commodore
Dewey in forcing an entrance to
Manila harbor in the face of these
defenses excites admiration while
among naval experts the dispatch
with which the American squadron
disposed of the Spaniards is held to
prove that Commodore Dewey em-
ployed the resources at his com-
mand with the highest possible
amount of effectiveness.

Lord Charles Beresford said:
"It was a brilliant stroke. Every-
thing, as I said to you before, de-
pends upon the man, in modern
naval warfare Dewey is an able
officer. He brought his command
warships with him. He thought
out and planned the whole affair
with consummate skill and fore-
sight."

The cabinet meeting today result-
ed in a decision to await the report
of Dewey and then send him the
number of troops necessary to en-
force control of the Philippines.
For these purposes the Pacific slope
troopships will be used, and it is ex-
pected that at least 5000 will be en-
route within the next 10 days.
There does not seem to be any doubt
as to the government's purpose to
hold the islands pending a final
settlement with Spain, when they
will be used as collateral to secure
payment to the United States of a
war indemnity.

A resolution was introduced in
the house today thanking Com-
modore Dewey and promoting him to
be an admiral.

May 4.

The British consul at Santiago
De Cuba is reported to have been
attacked by a mob of Spaniards,
when he fled, killing a Spaniard.
He was then placed in jail.

Rioting has occurred today in
many provinces and a revolution is
feared.

It is reported that the Cape Verde
fleet has been ordered to join the
fleet at Cadiz.

The gunboat Wilmington yester-
day completely destroyed the fort
belonged to at Cujana, Cuba.
Sampson's fleet sailed today and
it is thought an important naval
engagement is about to take place.

The government has ordered issue
of the Pacific Mail Co's steamers
capable of taking 10,000 troops to
the Philippine Islands. They will
convey the militia from California,
Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Mon-
tana, Nevada, Utah and Wyoming
to Manila.

The battleship Oregon and the
gunboat Mariette sailed for the
north.
