This year growers are anxious to get pickers, and they are already making engagements. A Yamhill grower gives notice in a McMinnville paper that he will furnish free transportation to and from his yard to all who will work for him and guarantee, besides, a small amount of advance money. Two years ago no such inducement was offered to labor anywhere in the West.

The boilers and the engines are in place, the upper and lower decks are enclosed, and the main deck will be turned out next week. It is intended to take the steamer to Portland the last of next week for inspection and furnishings, so that business can be commenced at once.
