The business portion of Westminister was totally destroyed by fire Sunday morning, with a loss of at least \$2,000,000. The fire started on the river front, and was caused by a spark from a steamer.

It transpires that O. M. Bartlett, alias Joe Howard, who was arrested near Albany for the theft of a boat, a gun and other articles from Corvallis, was an escaped insane patient, and he was returned to the asylum Saturday.

The dry house at M. Alexander's has just about a mile Southwest of town turned to the ground with one floor of hops, about one o'clock yesterday morning. We were unable to learn what the loss was, but it is placed at about \$300.

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Liveryman F. J. Irvine and his right and left bowers, Frank Butcher and Norman Dyer, are just about as busy these days as any three men in this neck of the woods. It keeps them pretty busy meeting trains with the marts transporting "drummers" to different sections of the county, and hauling freight for our merchants.

Rev. I. D. Diver is reported to be enthusiastic as ever for J. H. Mitchell for Senator. Another preacher sent is said to have gone back on Mitchell, and in consequence Rev. Diver is declared by a Salem paper to have made the remark that "Hell is full of such preachers with their legs sticking out at the windows." If true certainly a peculiar remark for a minister to make.

The new catalogue of the Mineral Springs College for 1898-9 is before us. It is replete in general information regarding the merits of the school, faculty, course of study, expenses and tuition. It gives a brief history of the college and its surroundings and its future course. There is no doubt that this school will one day—and that not far distant—be one of Oregon's chief institutions of learning.

The Rural Spirit says Del Norte, who has been referred to as a guideless pacer, is not a guideless pacer at all, as in the trials at Independence he was booted, hobbled and guided by a man on a running horse by his side. The time made showed what he can do if he is eventually really made a guideless pacer, but he should not be called one until he is actually guideless, going it alone, as a guideless horse does.

If a sufficient number of passengers can be secured an excursion will be run from Mill City to Newport and return Sunday. It will be the last excursion of the season and quite a number are anxious to go, but it is not definitely known whether the train will run far East as Mill City or not. The towns along the line are being canvassed and if the required number—fifty—are secured the train will run.

The town of Jerome, Arizona, was completely wiped out Sunday by fire. The few in property left before \$1,000,000. Eleven bodies have so far been recovered but it is impossible

to tell the exact number who lost their lives. Oscar Hyde, formerly of this city, is employed in a large steam laundry in Jerome, and no doubt the laundry was among the buildings to be reduced to ashes. The fire started in a cabin where a lot of Italians were engaged in a drunken row, and was caused by the overturning of a gasoline stove.

About the middle of August R. Shelton, as agent, sold to Mr. V. Cladek, of Daulap, Nebraska the Cyrus place, southeast of Scio, containing 1000 acres, and has received word from Mr. Cladek stating that he would leave Daulap this week with eight families, 23 people in all, for Scio, and that they would sub-divide the place and all locate on it. These people are Bohemians, and are all comparatively well-to-do, and will make good citizens. They expect to be followed by others who will locate in or near this immediate locality.

Last Friday evening Judge H. H. Hewitt's horse was stolen from his stables in Albany, and on Sunday evening a man traded a horse to Mike Bilyeu, in Jordan, which, upon investigation proved to be the stolen horse, and Geo. W. Morrow, of this city, went up to Jordan Tuesday evening and returned Wednesday morning with the horse, which he took to Albany the same day. The thief, after trading horses with Mr. Bilyeu, rode off, and finding no one at home at Mr. Manis, "traded" saddles with that gentleman, and soon after traded horses again, since which time he has not been heard of.

At Independence Monday Del Norte, as a guideless pacer, went a mile in the world's record 2:04, and as the horse that made the record is now dead Del Norte is the fastest guideless pacer in the world. It is claimed that the style of pacing done by Del Norte, with a running mate is the same as that by which the record was made. Over two dozen Albany men were present and saw the exhibition which they say was one of the prettiest ever seen. Del Norte beat Mosher on a runner out and then turned around and trotting back to the grand stand awaited the judges decision amidst the most enthusiasm ever seen on the track.—Democrat.
