The Corvallis Gazette says the

early sown flax on the Oregon Ex-
periment Station farm this year
yielded 2640 pounds per acre, and late
sown yielded 3639 pounds per acre.

Contracts for 1899 crop of beets are

being made at Watsonville, Cal.,
at \$4.50 per ton, an advance of 50
cents per ton over the price that has
been paid there for a number of years.

The commission appointed by the

representatives of Puget Sound Uni-
versity and Portland University, to de-
termine the location of the consoli-
dated university, have decided upon Portland.

A man just arrived in Astoria had

not heard of the war with Spain.
He left Sicily in February, and had
been on the water since without any
information of what had been going
on. He was Capt. Patterson of the
Forthland.

Wool buyers in Pendleton a few

days ago, says the East Oregonian,
were figuring on the amount of wool
in Oregon and Washington yet un-
sold, and figured out that at least
17,000,000 pounds were still in ware-
houses in the two states from this year's clip.

The Procter-Hanna-Elkins-Mc

Cook Company unlimited, is now buy-
ing options on the street car, electric
light and railway properties of Cuba
and Porto Rico. The sugar and tobacco
barons are already in possession, and
the questions of annexing those
islands may therefore be regarded
as settled.

Prof. J. W. Johnson, who was for

many years a professor in the Uni-
versity of Oregon, died at his home
in Eugene Tuesday night of last
week after a short illness, of brain
trouble. His wife and six children
survive him. One of his sons is at
Manila. Mr. Johnson, was one of
the pioneer instructors of the state,
and was highly respected by all who
knew him.

The season's record of the hop

product is practically the same
throughout the hop district of
Oregon and Washington. It is uni-
versally short, but superior in quality.
Prices being better than for several
years past, growers may be consid-
ered fortunate, first, in that the rela-
tively light crop will yield good re-
turns, and, second, that the reputa-
tion of the product, damaged by
several years of mold and lice, will
be measurably restored.

No more troops are to be mustered

out. Ninety-six thousand have been
mustered out. The situation does
not admit of any further reductions
in the army, and efforts being made
to put those volunteers who are
retained in the service as near as
possible on the footing of the regulars
in the matter of drill and discipline.
An effort is being made to eradicate
the materialistic idea of independence
among the troops, and to bring them
down to the strictest discipline.

Gordon," take some narrow,
small-souled view of his utterance
that some people in this country took
of our battle-cry in the Spanish war
—"Remember the Maine!" The bar-
barous despatches, like the barbarous
Spanish, had by one act insulted
and outraged the majesty of a nation.
In both cases the idea was not petty
spitefulness but a high and noble
avenging statement.—Ex.

The man who keeps cattle, sheep

and hogs, and breeds his work mares
regularly, has his business arranged
that money is coming in at all
seasons. His cattle and wood go to
market in the spring and early sum-
mer, and his hogs and mutton sheep
go in the fall and winter. If prices
are not the best for all, they are
sure to be good for one thing or another.
His corn hay are all fed, and he still
has his wheat to sell for cash. His
income comes to him at such times
that he has no use for the money
lender, and he has no notes to meet
or interest to pay.

The Salem Statesman says the Ore-

gon Poultry & Supply Co. will open
a creamery in their store rooms in
the Opera House, Salem, as soon as
the necessary improvements can be
made. From the description of the
creamery it appears, however, that
it will not be a creamery but a plant
for making what is known as imi-
tation creamery butter. This plan is
to collect freshly churned butter from
the farmers and work it up in the
form of creamery butter. This method
of handling butter is quite com-
mon in those portions of Minnesota
and adjoining states, which are not
well supplied with creameries.

ne natives, appointed by Aguinaldo
is on its way to Washington to con-
fer with President McKinley.

John L. Henderson, a lawyer, last

week swam from Hood River down
the Columbia 22 miles, 17 of it with-
out losing a stroke. He was in the
water five hours.

Now about 4,000 people, half or

more women or girls, are putting
forth \$75 worth of time and effort to
secure a legislative clerkship for 20
days at \$3 or \$4 per day.

Most of the diseases of swine arise

Prof. Johnson, of Eugene, left prop-

erty valued at \$19,500, giving it all
to his wife, trusting entirely to her
judgment in the care of the child-
ren. His life was insured for \$7,000.

purchased 3000 bushels and will take
10,000 bushels more if they can get
good ones.

The Episcopal Church of Eugene,

has received from Washington three
\$500 bonds which they subscribed
for recently. The bonds bear 3 per
cent interest and are now selling in
the market at 1.034.

Davis, a member of the peace com-

will secure from the situation what-
ever American courage, honor and
valor have gained."
