Roy Calavan was driving a horse to a spring wagon, and drove up to Gill's Lardware store to water the horse at the pump, and took the bridle off the horse, when it started down the

street at a lively gallop. The two little boys were lying on their backs, and the horse turned toward the mill and then started across the creek back of the hotel, and as it made the turn back of the hotel the wagon tipped over onto its side and the little boys "slid" out. The horse ran into the creek where it got free from the wagon and was soon "captured."

For about a year past a little daughter of Mr. and Mrs. L. L. Calavan has been under the medical treatment of Dr. A. G. Prill for curvature of the spine. It had never been able to walk although it was three years old. The mode of treatment was to place a plaster jacket on the child, and the art of putting them on was both difficult to the physician and trying to the child, but under the treatment the little one has been enabled to walk and handle itself. Some months ago Dr. Prill made a plaster cast of the baby's body and sent this to New York and from it was made a paper jacket to be worn by the child. It is made in two pieces and laces together, and is easily put on and removed. Should nothing occur unforeseen at the present time the child will be enabled to walk and handle itself and ultimately be strong and healthy.

Last Saturday morning, about four o'clock J. E. Warwick and L. W. McWhorter, a notion store, went out in search of a bear which was supposed to be in immediate neighborhood, and they at once began the work of congregating their 27 more or less, flat-bottomed boats, using the creek for a notion store, and with a voice like a fog whistle, and the way those bounds answered to roll call was wonderful. On Friday last the master who lost the horse to Mr. Bilyeu was seen in the Jordan neighborhood and Mr. Bilyeu and a neighbor placed him under arrest and sent for Deputy Sheriff Morrow, who went up and took him and proceeded to Albany with him the same evening, where he was given a hearing and held under \$500 bonds to the grand jury. He is a sort of a half witted fellow, and is purely of the hobnob type. He admitted his guilt, and said he had become tired of tramping and concluded to try riding. He gave his name as White. The horse which Mr. Bilyeu traded to him was from another one, which was run over by a train and killed. This left him without a horse so he went to Albany and stole the Neely horse, which he was riding when arrested. One of the peculiar things told by him was that he was in the barns of both Judge Hewitt and Neely when they came to the evening to feed their horses. After Judge Hewitt went out he took the horse, went up to the barn of Ole Woodworth, got his saddle and shipped out for the country.
