State Sunday School Association.

The thirteenth annual convention of the Oregon State Sunday School Association will be held in the First Baptist church at Portland, Oct. 4-6.

The plans to be presented and the work to be done will make this convention, without question, the most important ever held in our state, not only for our Sunday Schools but for the state at large; owing to this, large numbers from all portions of the state have responded.

The Oregon Industrial Exposition will be complete and in full running order at this time, and all rates made by the various transportation companies for this Exposition will also be good for this convention. On October 5th, the Southern Pacific Co., will sell round trip tickets from all points on its lines within the state at a fare and one-third, and all round trips will be good for four days.

Colliers Weekly.

The current issue of Colliers Weekly contains some more striking illustrations of life at the great army camp at Montauk Point. The pictures, which were drawn by Mr. West C. Clinton, shows President McKinley at General Wheeler's headquarters, on Saturday, September 3. Caroline Duer has a poem of considerable pathos, entitled "Eight Long Miles to Sibony," accompanied by a character drawing by Albert E. Sterner. One page is given up to scenes in Ponce, Puerto Rico. Henry Mavers' full-page cartoon, entitled "The Dry Land," is artistic and full of meaning. In fact it is the first of six illustrated sketches, entitled Adventures of A. J. Baffles, by E. W. Hornung, and there is an essay on "The Foot," by Alice Meynell. A page is also devoted to "The Drama," marking the practical beginning of the theatrical season in New York.
