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The sugar beet factory was put in to successful operation at La Grande Tuesday, October 4. This is the first plant of the kind in the Pacific Northwest, and the citizens of Union county deserve great credit for their untiring effort in putting this plant in operation.

Especially are to be commended in the large undertaking of producing beets for the factory, and we regret that in some instances their labor will be interrupted by the best have. The turned out so well as was expected owing mostly to the hot winds in August. The beets, however, are proving to be very rich in sugar, which will tend to lessen their loss. The factory is running like clock work, and there will be enough beets to keep it in operation about 100 days.

Evaporators of apples and other fruits who seek a foreign outlet must learn this aspect, we might say, have been forced upon manufacturers. The latter know that they must cater to the wishes and whims of the people whom they would serve in the matter of furnishing just what is demanded. In spite of the unsatisfactory experiences of recent years the practice is still followed of shipping to German markets fruit cured upon zinc frames, the sale of which is prohibited by law. The authorities there are also just now objecting to the distribution of sulphur bleached apricots and other like products. A persistence in violating the German statutes in this regard will result in the entire exclusion of such fruits from that country, irrespective of their general excellence. If those engaged in drying fruits would use better judgment in this respect, we might say, they would have a much larger trade in Europe than is now the case.—The Orange Judd Farmer.

All that is left to mark the site of the historic old building, known as the Corvallis college, are a few stumps and some scattered lumber. An act of the territorial legislature of 1857 legalized the movement of the part of citizens of Corvallis to the Corvallis college, and in 1859 the building was nearly completed. The block upon which it stood was donated by Benton county. The movement at the beginning was undenominational, but later on it was made a Protestant school. The building was known as the Corvallis college until 1872, when the legislature passed an act locating the agricultural college at Corvallis, and placing it under the control of that institution. In 1887 the new college building was erected on the property of the state, and relationship was severed with Corvallis college.—Oregon Union.

An elevator which carries rolled grain from the first set of rolls in Johnson & Phillips' mill failed to work Monday evening, and the machine soon got so full of grain that the rolls could not turn, thus stopping the shaft in the basement. The shaft in the basement slipped on the large pulley, and in a few moments smoke from it came pouring up the stairway. A. J. Johnson, G. W. Phillips, Sr., and Geo. Phillips were in the mill at the time. A. M. and Chas. Young, the night men, were attending a meeting of the Modern Woodmen, and in a very short space of time Mr. Johnson shut down the mill and made a record-breaking run for the lodge room. G. A. Warner, the head miller, was also at the mill, and all adjourned without ceremony to the mill. The fire bell had got in its work in the meantime, and soon the mill was crowded with men, all looking for the fire. As soon as Geo. Young and Charlie Warner entered the mill they could smell the burned lumber, and looked at the trouble instantly, and as soon as the grain was taken out of the choked elevator the mill was started. The fire boys had laid a line of hose, and were ready for business, but there really been a fire. Mr. Phillips, in his attempt to get into the basement as soon as possible, missed the stairway and fell to the floor below, badly bruising his face and head, and breaking his lantern all to pieces.
