The special session of the legislature only employed 103 clerks—one for each member and 13 to spare.

The general appropriation bill as passed at the extra session of the legislature carried in round numbers \$1,900,000.

The Eugene Register says the Oregon state university is nothing if not progressive. Henceforth the Spanish language will be taught in that institution.

Hobson sunk a \$350,000 ship in the channel of Santiago harbor, which was a brave though reckless act. Now he has succeeded in rising a \$3,000,000 ship which more than offsets the loss of the other.

It is almost certain that a new cabinet office will be created this winter by congress—that of secretary of colonies. Should the Philippines be retained by the United States such an office would be a necessity.

The appropriation of \$7000 of the states money for the purpose of paying the members of the house of representatives of the 97 holdup is one of the boldest robberies yet charged up to the special session. Aside from the branch asylum steal of \$30000 it has no parallel in the annals of the Oregon legislatures.

By the sudden death of Mrs. Geer, wife of Oregon's governor-elect, Hon. T. T. Geer, a shadow of grief has been cast over the entire state. Mrs. Geer was not possessed of the best of health, and had gone to Omaha on a pleasure trip, accompanied by her husband, and after retiring crossed over the dark river while her husband slept. Death came to her without pain or a struggle. When her husband arose in the morning all that was left on earth of the dear one who had shared with him life's joys and sorrows, was cold in death. The people of Oregon deeply sympathize with Governor Geer in his sad hour of grief, in that this calamity has come to his home and deprived him of his estimable wife.

It seems strange that there was a protest against the allowance of \$2000 for electric lighting in the statehouse for two years, but it was explained by the statement that it was according to a contract duly entered into by a former legislature, which could not now be abrogated. All the members appeared to regard the charge as exorbitant, and Curtis boldly called it a "graft," but it had to go. These "graft" contracts are numerous. They turn up almost every day in every corner of the state house, and although they are proven to be exorbitant and out of all reason they generally get votes enough to get through. Political promises and bossism can accomplish almost any end in the affairs of state and even county government.

A Colorado gentleman recently advertised for a well preserved skeleton, and shortly after the paper was out an old maid of his town appeared in her best bib and tucker and asked him if his intentions were honorable.

The Rockefeller family cemetery is at Lake View, Cleveland. A month, the largest ever quarried in the United States, is to mark the family plot. It is to be 62 feet high and 10 feet square at the base. It comes from Barre, Vt. Special cars had to be made to transport it. The Egyptian Obelisk in Central Park is 29 feet taller.

The water main pipes for the water works system to be put in at the Eagle Woolen Mills have arrived, and work will at once be commenced laying the pipe from the reservoir to the mill. The latest patent fire extinguishing apparatus has been purchased and will be added to the equipment of mill soon.—Brownsville Times.

Lester Wright, a freight brakeman, while his train was side-tracked at Ruckles station at 4 o'clock Saturday morning, for the overland to pass, was sent ahead to flag the train. When passing, the conductor of the overland, informed the other crew that Wright was lying by the track unconscious, his head in a pool of blood, bleeding at the mouth and nostrils, with a wound back of his right ear, and a pistol near by with the handle broken off. The wound is serious, but it is not thought to be fatal. The circumstances are mysterious, but it is believed he was attacked by traps.

## OF GENERAL INTEREST

Nebraska's corn crop this year is worth \$37,500,000.

There are now 307 pupils attending the Independence public schools.

Twenty carloads of hops have already left Independence, of this year's crop.

The great London financier, Ernest Ogden Lambert, failed, with liabilities estimated at 1,000,000 pounds.

The Chinese have decided to reduce their internal troubles to the minimum by exterminating all foreigners.

The enrolled members of the Methodist Church in Canada is 230,537, one-fifth of the entire population of the Dominion.

Spain is amazed at the American demand concerning the Philippines. She will be still more disconcerted if she fails to comply with it.

The net valuation of taxable property in Oregon in 1894 was \$146,691,272; in 1895 it was \$150,151,431 and in 1896 it was \$133,772,122.

New history of Philadelphia is in press, but will be held back to await the result of the pending suit between Wanamaker and Quay.

Boss Croker is never without a Tammany understudy, but it is hardly fair on his part to engage all of them from the same family.

The will of the dead Empress of Austria is said to leave \$2,500,000 to charity. A woman with a heart so large was a real friend to humanity.

It is stated that more people have been injured by bicycles during the last year than have been killed and injured as passengers on the railroads.

Spain will be taking desperate chances on the next war should the government adopt Senor Polo's proposition for a new navy of 100 vessels.

Commodore Watson takes a very cheerful view of the outcome of the war, which he regards as a citizen, the game was called just as he was going to bat.

Middle-of-the-road Populists in Colorado have surprised the country by nominating Simon Guggenheim as their candidate for governor. Guggenheim is usually on the sidewalk.

The Red Lake reservation in Minnesota has just been thrown open to settlement under the Nelson act, which requires five years' residence and the payment of \$3.35 an acre at the end of that period. The territory includes 367,000 acres.

Six citizens of Portland and one of Union have bought out the charter of the Oregon Equipment Company, and have incorporated under the same name with an authorized capital of \$2,500,000, for the purpose of building the proposed railroad from Union, Oregon, to Bear, Idaho.

A bill has been introduced in the Oregon legislature asking for the right of a sheriff to name a paper for publishing his official notices, and giving it to the complainant. This will be no benefit to any newspaper, and will simply give lawyers a leg, in whose interest it draws.

W. A. Baker, an aged pioneer of Irving precinct, was committed to Eugene Wednesday and ordered committed to the state insane asylum. He is 73 years of age. The cause of the attack is given as senile decay. He is violent when excited and threatens to kill.

The latest invention is a musical clock that can be set so that it will play "Home, Sweet Home," at 10 o'clock; "Tramp, Tramp, the Boys are marching," at 10:15, and "Johnny Get Your Gun," at 10:30. The device is considered a valuable one by parents who have marriageable daughters.

In the opinion of the St. Louis Globe Democrat anything in the nature of a donation is sure to strike the Spaniard favorably. The offer of the government to give free transportation to the families of officers from Cuba to Spain has resulted in an avalanche of weddings over the island.

The Chicago postoffice is to have a new permanent employee, a physician, at a salary of \$1700 a year. He will be stationed in the main office for the purpose of examining employees who report themselves as being sick, and it is expected that he will make a large saving to the government in salaries.

The Oregon boys at Manila will no doubt rejoice at the arrival of a cargo of Oregon hickory which has recently been shipped to the Philippines. The shipment consists of 2,000,000 pounds packed and sealed in tin cases. It is made of Oregon hickory by Oregon hands, and while it is hardack it will be "from home" to the boys.

## CHESSE

J. I. Jones and Charles Young, of Rainier, died at that place last Sunday from eating canned lobsters, shrimps and sea clams, and Walter Furrow was brought to a hospital in Portland nearly dead from the same cause. The three men resided near town and had come in to attend a meeting of the Knights of Pythias, of which they were members, and had eaten a lunch of canned goods prior to going to lodge. They were taken sick the following day with the above result.

Here is Joe Simon's promise: "Having been elected senator I shall know no part of the state in preference to another. My endeavor will be to advance the best interests of Oregon and to be fair to all parts of the state. It will also be my aim to work in harmony with the other members of the Oregon delegation in congress, and to do what I can for bringing about harmony in the republican party, and to wipe out factional differences, successful or not. I believe I will have accomplished a great deal that will be for the best interests of the state.

Senate bill No. 72, introduced by Brownell, is now a law. It provides that the result of a judgment debtor for personal services, at and time within 30 days next preceding the service of an attachment of said earnings upon a garnishee, shall not be included in the judgment in said action against said debtor, when it shall be made to appear by the affidavit of said judgment debtor, or otherwise, that such earnings are necessary for the use of a family supported wholly or partly by the labor of said debtor."

An exchangelet by the following truth: "If a newspaper man knows how many knocks he received behind his back he would adopt another calling." remarks a citizen, the other day. The citizen was mistaken. The newspaper man who succeeds expects to be maligned by every lawbreaker, swindler and hypocrite, and every critic and lover of notoriety who do not agree with him on public and political questions. The newspaper man who expects to go through life with being misrepresented and unjustly censured, should make arrangements to die young.

Southern Mexico is a great country. Consul-General Pollard tells of one fruit orchard of 125 acres near Monterrey. It contains 700 orange trees, 2000 pear trees, besides mandarins, grape-fruit, Japanese plums, apricots, peaches, lemons, olives, grapes blackberries and raspberries. The climate is endless summer. Two crops of vegetables may be raised each year. The government has granted to accompany from Stamford, Conn., an immense tract of land from which dry woods will be exported.

Intending settlers should carry with them not less than \$500 in gold, which will pay all of the family expenses for the first year.

When Col. Roosevelt's troops were mustered out he made a speech to them in which he said: "Now here's a thing I want to warn you against. Don't get gay and worn as heroes. Don't go back and live on your laurels; they'll wither. The world will be kind to you for about ten days, and then it will say: 'He's spoiled by the fame of the regiment in Cuba.' Don't think you've got the best of everything, and don't consider yourselves as martyrs in the past tense. What I want of all of you is to get right out and fight your battles in the world as bravely as you fought the nation's battles in Cuba."

That was good advice, and he needs to take it home to himself nowadays. Since his nomination for governor, he has found just how show-slowers were all the expressions of admiration for his bravery in Cuba. He has already been proven dishonest, the creature of a boss and a civil service evader, and there are yet three weeks left of the campaign.

It is reported that Spain will ask the United States to pay part of the unpaid Cuban debt, to pay for the Philippine islands, or allow Spain to sell them to some other nation. Spain would not be Spain if she was not incapable of appreciating generosity; if she was not utterly lacking in magnanimity, and if she allowed Spain to keep all her war vessels in the captured territory; the Terror and others at San Juan; the Alfonso XII and other war vessels at Havana, and other ports; we have allowed her to exact customs dues from the United States, and carry off to Spain from Cuba and Porto Rico about every thing portable that she can steal and find room for on her transports. It is safe to say that the United States will not assume a dollar of the Cuban debt, nor will it pay Spain a cent for any part of the Philippines, nor allow Spain to sell them to Germany or any other power of Europe. We might easily within the rights of the victor have exacted a large indemnity from Spain. We waived this right and opportunity, and certainly will not now pay a practical indemnity to Spain for having beaten her into paralysis in a war of sixty days.
