The county clerk has been ordered to ask for bids for remodeling the court house at Albany, the same to be opened at the January term of county court. The court house needs remodeling, and needs it bad, but the clerk should not, and we trust will not, pay more for the job than it is worth. The time has past for exorbitant prices for the erection of public buildings.

Residents of the Yukon region who went in there last summer will learn what a Northern winter really is, and when spring fully opens will gladly welcome every scrap of news from the outside. A copy of even some obscure, struggling, Oregon weekly of next January issue, if it could be sent into that frozen up section by pigeon express, would bring enough to make the publisher feel like a blasted bondholder.

The great meteor showers of 1883, 1890, are becoming due again. They occur every 33 years, when the earth is in their path. An advance shower is looked for this year, as usual, but the grand display is due next year. Astronomers begin to look for them on Nov. 11 and then keep on watching for several nights. They fire up from the cycle of Leo in the North Eastern sky and are most visible from 10:30 to 12 at night. Another shower is Nov. 27th from Andromeda.

The county poor farm will cost the taxpayers \$5,200, and added to this will be the expense of a manager. While this looks like a good sized bill of expense, still it is likely that the farm can be made more than self-sustaining, and thus the county's poor can be cared for in much better shape and at less cost to the county than by the present system. No doubt a man could take the farm just purchased and make considerable money on it, and the county should be able to do the same thing.

It cost Linn county a fraction over \$100 for a man to buy his self to an oak grub near Mukers. Had he walked a little farther and jumped into the river, with his pockets properly filled with rocks, the county would have been \$18 ahead. The expense could have been somewhat lessened, however, had the coroner instructed the justice of the peace of this district to hold the inquest, and he would have employed a Linn county physician. By economy in even the county's smallest transactions a large amount of money might be saved the taxpayers each month.

At Lake Leaberge we met an Englishman who was taking his wife and three children for a trip to Five Finger rapids. His wife was a squaw, and her face was painted black, as were also those of the children. I never did find out the real reason those squaws have for painting their faces black. Some say it is because they think it makes them more beautiful, and still others claim that it is a preventive from the mosquitoes. We became quite friendly with this Englishman. He was taking his family to visit some of his wife's people. He had just received news from England that the death of three persons made him heir to a noble title, and quite an inheritance, but to enjoy its possession, etc. of course he would have to return to England. "Of course," said I, "you are going at once." He looked around at his family and said: "Well, I could hardly take them with me, and I'm too fond of them to leave them here, so I think I'll stay here myself and let the other fellow enjoy my property over there." This was all said with a degree of pathos which was almost sublime, and yet I could not help picturing to myself the sensation that that squaw wife would make at some reception held among his titled friends who were to enter an estate, as we were looking at her then. I think something of the same thought must have passed through our friend's mind, for, hastily murmuring "what might have been," etc. he looked suspiciously like shuddering a few tears, bade us a hurried farewell, and gathered his small family and belongings together and proceeded on his way. OF GENERAL INTEREST

On the first Monday in March there will be an examination at Salem to fill a vacancy at West Point. It will be conducted by President Hawley of Willamette university.

It is rumored that Judge R. B. Bean, of Salem will be appointed by Governor Lord to fill the vacancy in the university board of regents caused by the death of Henry Fallin.

Mr. H. F. Merrill, of Albany, who is a nephew of the late Henry Fallin of Portland was substantially remembered in the will of his uncle, receiving \$5,000. The entire estate is valued at about \$2,000,000.

Gen. Weyler is said to have bestowed forth in the grave yard of a miser of alms. Stories come from Spain to the effect that he is giving much money from his private resources to Spanish soldiers who, through failure to get their pay, are destitute.

Tuesday was the last day on which China pheasants could be killed. It is hoped that the law will be respected from now on, as the birds have been pretty well killed off and unless more are left over there will not be much hunting next season.

David M. Dunne, collector of Internal revenue at Portland has notified all Oregon banks that unstamped receipts can be received from depositors for funds deposited, but such receipts can not be received from third parties or anything but the depositor.

The Journal admits that in five years the property assessment of Salem has decreased 22 per cent.—it was never very large,—and that the city is running behind \$100,000 a year. J. R. Geddes, president of the college at Seaside, was in the city Saturday. The treasury statement of the public debt shows that at the close of business, Oct. 31, 1893, the debt was not cash in the treasury amounted to \$1,119,966,922, an increase for the month of \$41,487,717. This increase is accounted for by the issue during the month of about 36,680,000 of the new 3 per cent bonds, and a decrease of about 7,238,000 in the cash on hand. The entire amount of the new loan so far taken up in the monthly statement is \$179,359,180.

Mrs. Julius Gradwohl, one of the pioneer women of Albany, died at her home in that city Saturday evening at 8:25, of diabetes. While attending a meeting of the Rebekah lodge a week ago she stepped off of a low platform of about six inches height and fell, causing a fracture of the hip. The fall it is believed hastened the action of the disease with which she had been afflicted for several years, but which had not proven serious until recently.

The Oregon sugar company has closed the La Grande factory for the season. The output of sugar, a little more than 1,200,000 lbs. was made, but what was originally estimated would be the year's production. The deficit was occasioned by the fact that many of the best fields did not come up to the average, because of ignorance of methods of cultivation, hundreds of acres not being harvested at all, as growers did not think the crop would pay expenses of digging.

During the last six months Marion county spent \$2900 out of her county treasury for gopher, squirrel, coon and bear traps. This is too much, and there is every reason to believe that Marion has purchased hundreds of dollars worth of traps of animals captured in Polk, Clackamas and Linn counties. Our scalp bill will be low, however during the next six months, as the county court this week made an order stopping the payment of bounties after the 14th inst.—Salem Sentinel.

A Poor Farm Selected.

The County Court last Friday agreed upon a poor farm. The one selected from the several considered was 120 acres off the farm Mrs. Mary Cundiff, four miles from Albany on the Oakville road. It is in splendid cultivation with good buildings, and cost Mrs. Cundiff \$50 an acre. Also gets the growing crop and all the horses, cattle, swine and machinery, for which \$1200 will be paid. Payments are to be \$1,000 cash, a warrant for \$1,000 payable Dec. 15, and a warrant for \$2,500 payable May 1, without interest if paid as agreed if not to draw 6 per cent. A farmer and his wife will be elected probably at the December term, and they will have charge of probably nine or ten poor people to start with, which will be gradually increased from those receiving aid.—Democrat.

In view of the discussion over the partition of China and the possibility that through Russian usurpation the U. S. may lose some of the export trade long enjoyed, it is interesting to know something of the extent of the business. Our exports have been very uneven in amount, as low as \$4,000,000 in '80, 111 millions in '95 but since that date increasing rapidly nearly 12 in '96 and 13 millions in '97. The exports ended July 31, '98, were somewhat smaller at 15,257,000. The loss was chiefly in cotton goods, China buying less of these in all countries; incidentally China is increasing her imports of raw cotton.
