The election for city officers in this city passed off very quietly last Monday. A total of 72 votes did not take the trouble to go the polls. The only fight made was on marsh. Three tickets were out, but there was very little difference in them. The result of the votes was:

Aldermen—S. M. Daniel, 30; M. M. Peery, 30; C. W. Johnson, 32; John Sims, 60; S. L. Shore, 29; L. W. Richardson, 24; Ira A. Phelps, 60; Frank Irvine, 15; J. C. Simpson, 30; R. Goin, 47; O. B. Cyrus, 27; R. E. Hibler, 27; Geo. Munkers, 17; W. A. Ewing, 18. A few scattering votes were cast, but as they did not effect the result they are not given here.

By reason of M. M. Peery being elected mayor, his vote for alderman was not effective, and it was this fact that elected S. L. Shore.

The council will be composed of M. M. Peery, mayor, aldermen S. M. Daniel, C. W. Johnson, John Sims, S. L. Shore, Ira A. Phelps, V. R. Goin and J. C. Simpson.

Recorder, R. Shelton, treasurer, W. F. Gill and marshal N. Young were re-elected.

The Cyrus Farm Sale Completed.

V. Cladek accompanied by Mr. Lamplott, was over to Albany the first of the week, and closed up the deal whereby he became possessor of the 1000 acres of land a short distance southeast of this city known as the Wm. Cyrus farm. Mention of the purchase of this farm, was made through the agency of R. Shelton & Co., of this city, was made in these columns some time ago. Referring to the sale of this property the Democrat of Albany says:

"The big William Cyrus farm, consisting of one thousand acres of very fine land, has been sold to Mr. V. Cladek, recently of Duluth, Neb., where for fourteen years he has been successfully a big cheese factory. Besides Mr. Cladek there are five other families here, who will locate in the same neighborhood, and five more families will arrive next Friday. Others are expected to follow, the nucleus of a settlement of Bohemians. Mr. Cladek and Mr. Lamplott were in the city today and the Democrat man had the pleasure of meeting them. They are educated men full of energy and push, a thrifty people who work wonders. Mr. Cladek takes twenty-one papers and has one of the finest libraries in the county, a fact we mention merely to show the value to our country of such citizens. When a Bohemian gets hold of a farm he doesn't wait till tomorrow, but gets right to work and the place soon looks like a new one with its better fences, good roads and improved buildings. The residents of this Bohemian settlement will do mixed farming and besides Mr. Cladek is going to start a cheese factory at Scio."

The Democrat fails to state that these people become citizens of Linn county through the recommendations and efforts of the people of Scio, and especially Mr. Shelton, but keeps as far from locating them near this city as possible. Nevertheless they are here and are now Linn county citizens, and the whole of it is being carried by the country, but the people of Scio want just a little credit for getting them here.

They are in position to turn out more wealth than ever before, the laborer of the mill and factory hand is becoming more and more productive and with this increased ability to produce wealth all around there should come higher wages, greater comforts, greater happiness.—The American.
