Very New Game Law.

The game protective features of the Marsh bill are as follows: Deer, moose and mountain sheep, protected from November 1 to July 15, and the killing for market of such game animals prohibited entirely.

Spotted fawn, not to be killed at all. Beaver, killing of prohibited for 20 years. Silver gray squirrel protected from January 1 to October 1.

Grouse, prairie chickens pheasants Mongolian pheasants, quails and partridges, protected in Western Oregon between December 1 to October 1.

English partridges and wild turkeys, protected until February 1, 1904. Jacksnipe, protected from February 1 to September 1.

Other salient features of the bill are: Deer hunting prohibited between one hour after sunset and half an hour before sunrise.

Deer hunting prohibited with dogs. Market hunting of Mongolian pheasants prohibited for a period of three years.

Market hunting of grouse, pheasants, quail, silver pheasants and green or Japanese pheasants, prohibited November 15 to October 15.

Trap, net or snare hunting of upland birds except for breeding or exhibition purpose prohibited.

Taking of eggs or destruction of the nest of any game bird, whether aquatic or upland, prohibited.

Market hunting of wild ducks, geese or swan prohibited; also the shipment of such fowls out of the state.

Market hunting of jacksnipe prohibited.

Possession of deer, spotted fawn moose or mountain sheep, except he may be kept as a household pet, or possession of an upland or aquatic bird within the proscribed season, unless kept for breeding purposes, shall be prima facie evidence of a violation of the law.

Shooting upon or from any public highway prohibited.

Hunting upon farms of growing or standing grain without the permission of the owners, prohibited.

Number of upland birds that may be killed a day within the limits of the open season, restricted to 15.

Shipment of upland birds, for other than breeding purposes by railway steamboat or express companies prohibited.

County courts given the power to shorten the close season for upland birds, whenever they may deem it necessary or expedient.

A violation of any of the provisions of the law except that relating to the selling of deer, moose and mountain sheep, is made punishable by a fine of from \$15 to \$200 or imprisonment for a term ranging from 7 days to 90 days, or both. The penalty for violating the section protecting deer, moose and mountain sheep ranges from a fine of \$100 to \$500, or imprisonment or both a fine and imprisonment.

Senator Montero Rios, who was president of the Spanish peace commission has resigned the presidency of the senate owing to the popular outcry against his defense of the commission. All the surviving captains of Spanish warships destroyed in the naval battles off Santiago de Cuba and in Manila by the American fleet will be court-martialed.

Branton Must Hang.

Claude Branton convicted of the murder of John A. Linn, of Lane county, June 16, 1898, will have to hang, as the supreme court has handed down an opinion affirming the judgment of the lower court of which Hon. J. W. Hamilton is judge. The opinion was written by Justice Moore.

Application will be made for a new trial by Branton's attorneys, but this decision of the supreme court can be taken as practically final, and at the next term of court in March, Branton will be again sentenced to be hanged.
