In the matter of application of D. Clifford et al. for county road, R. H. Irvine, J. Huber and Henry Shank were appointed viewers with J. A. Warner as surveyor to meet at Jordan on March 27 at 10 a. m.  
In application of R. C. Watkins et al. for county road T. J. Phillipot, S. Barz and Jas. Rice were appointed viewers with T. A. Riggs as surveyor, to meet at the site of the road on March 25 at 10 a. m.  
Petition asking that Mohawk river be declared a public highway was continued.  
Filing fee of \$10 in case of estate of John Marshall was remitted to C. A. Smith.  
Under the new law Linn county's assessor will get annual salary of \$2000, out of which he must pay all deputy hire.

**Change in Salaries.**  
Under the new law passed by the legislature the district attorney of the third judicial district will draw an annual salary of \$4150. Out of this salary deputies are to be paid as follows: Madison county, \$500; Linn \$400; Yamhill, \$250; Tillamook, \$200. Other new laws relating to fees and salaries are: Senate bill 36—sheriffs shall collect 10 cents a mile for serving processes in civil cases, and pay the money to the county treasurer at the end of the month. Constructive mileage is not allowed. Senate bill 32—Requiring county clerks and clerks of the county court to administer all oaths required in matters of pensions, and to certify pension vouchers and affix the seal of the county court without charge. Took effect on February 17th.

**A FATAL FALL.**  
Joseph Cary Meets Death by Falling Through a Bridge.

Again has the silent grave received its reward; again has loving hearts been left in the hands of a following; again has the lesson of the frailty of worldly things been taught.

Last Saturday morning as the C. & E. train approached the bridge across the Scio Santiam river, about six miles from this city, the body of a man was observed lying on the ground below the bridge. Word was at once sent to coroner J. G. Norman, who, accompanied by a physician and three other gentlemen, at once went to the scene on a handcar.

The body was found head downward wedged between two large boulders and two deep cuts on the top of the head told the story of the awful plunge. The body lay about 30 feet from the end of the trestle and was not bruised only on the head. The coroner empaneled a jury and they found that the deceased was Joseph Cary, of Scio, and that he came to his death by accidentally falling from the bridge, a distance of 22 feet.

Deceased has been visiting in Albany with his cousin, Mrs. George Kauble, for several days and left her house about 7:30 Thursday evening saying he was going to see Sheriff Mankers on business. It is thought he started to walk home Thursday evening as that is the last time he was seen alive. A splined plank with a strip nailed to it was directed over where the body was found and it is possible that he caught his foot and was pitched headlong.

Deceased was born near this city September 25, 1866, and was the son of Abner Cary. His father and one brother, John Cary, survive him.

Joseph Cary, as he was familiarly known in and about Scio, was a man of many friends, and was himself his worst enemy. He was a salesman behind the counter of great ability, and had acted in that capacity in several of the business houses here. His only fault was strong drink and this alone caused his downfall. He had been employed by Geo. DeVaney, near Thomas, for several weeks past, and when he went to Albany several days ago, Mr. DeVaney paid him in full for his labor, which amounted to about \$12.

The funeral services were held in this city, Sunday, March 12 conducted by Rev. Osborne, and the interment was made at the Masonic cemetery.

J. S. Lewis vs John and M. B. Craft. The judge took the case away from the jury and gave the plaintiff judgment for \$30, money which had been advanced to defendants as part payment on a cattle deal. Plaintiff also demanded \$185 damages for failure of defendants to deliver the cattle, but the judge did not give them judgment for that sum.

Z. H. Davis vs B. S. Martin, recovery of money on promissory note. A jury trial was called for and the case occupied nearly all the day Wednesday. Defendant claimed he had paid the note by turning over cattle to plaintiff, but had failed to receive the note. The jury returned a verdict for plaintiff.
