ALONG THE COAST.

Items of General Interest Gleaned From the Thriving Pacific States.

Another Sensational Gold Strike.

A sensational special to the Spokane-Herald says another sensational strike has been made in that camp. The shaft of the Good Luck Consolidated, at a depth of 30 feet, struck a body of high grade ore. At the time the dispatch was sent, the miners were out with a cross-cut three feet, and it is thought the ledge is not less than five feet wide. The correspondent carefully sampled the dump, and three assays ran \$250, \$300 and \$300. The stock had been selling at Republic at 2 cents, and now brokers are skimming around for it in all directions.

Accident Delayed Mail.

A packhorse, carrying the mail between Roseburg and Myrtle Point, Oregon, fell off a grade when going down the Middle Coquille, the night of March 10, and was badly crippled. That route is sparsely settled, and it was impossible to procure an animal to bring the mail in on time, hence the Coquille valley people missed their mail. Similar occurrences have taken place all winter, and all are becoming resigned to the inconvenience.

Tacoma Girls at Manila.

Captain Patton, of the liner Victoria, which arrived at Tacoma recently from Manila and Japan, brought word that during the late battle near Manila, Miss Leslie Bennett and Miss Wallace, of Tacoma, were among the women who were placed aboard one of the American transports, which steamed out of range of the vessels of the belligerents.

Irrigation Lands Sold.

All the lands in the middle Kittitas irrigation district in Washington, that were delinquent on the taxes were sold at Ellensburg, and were bid in by J. W. Withersop, the holder of the bonds. Quite a number of the large taxpayers took advantage of Withersop's offer and paid their taxes, taking bond from him on the basis of \$11,000, instead of \$24,000, the amount actually due him.

Will Enter a Museum.

C. W. Bricker, of Dallas, Or., is the tallest person in Folk county. He is 30 years of age, still growing, and stands 6 feet 10 1/2 inches. He has secured employment in a San Francisco museum. With him will go Jake C. Wilcox, of Ballston, who is a dwarf, 35 years of age, 52 inches high and weighing 180 pounds. Mr. Bricker is well proportioned, and weighs 225 pounds.

New Society at Seattle.

The congregation to which Rev. Alfred W. Martin has lectured at Ranke hall, Seattle, for the past few weeks, has been organized on a business basis, with about 50 members. After the lecture recently, a meeting was held, over which E. O. Graves presided. Upon the adoption of a name for the association, which will now be known as the "Society of Universal Religion."

The Marshfield Water Front.

The survey of the "hog's back," which has just been completed by Morton L. Towner, shows that the inside channel, along the Marshfield, Or., water front, is the deeper by six inches. This channel is also much the straightest, and there seems to be no doubt that the dredging will be done there. The dredging is to begin on the 26th of this month.

Comet Growing Fainter.

Professor Lewis Swift writes from Lowe observatory on Echo mountain, in Southern California, that the comet which he discovered on March 3 is growing fainter. It is moving in a northeasterly direction. It has a broad, short tail, point towards the sun and a star-like nucleus. Its orbit has not yet been determined.

Attempt to Commit Suicide.

Madame Charles Bianchini, wife of the famous scenic artist, whose trial on a charge of attempting to poison her husband resulted in conviction, has been sentenced to five years' penal servitude. As she was leaving the courtroom the prisoner made a futile attempt to commit suicide by plunging herself with a hatpin.

It is said the mines were shut down for the purpose of allowing some of the big stockholders to freeze out the little ones.

Increase in Alaska Trade.

Tacoma clothing stores report a steady increase of Alaska business. The most noteworthy changes in the buyers' wants from last year are the demand for furs instead of woollens, and for lighter foot gear. Moccasins are popular. Heavy blankets are unsaleable.

New Fraternal Hall.

The Masons and Odd Fellows of Canyon City, Or., have advertised for bids for a two-story stone building to be used for fraternal and business purposes.

A Murderer Caught.

William Alibi, the Italian who killed James Halley, alias Lacey, in a gambling hall in Spokane recently, was captured by an Italian cabin, near Priest river, Idaho. He resisted arrest with a Winchester rifle, but was finally persuaded by his countrymen to yield.

Immigrants Arriving.

It is estimated that fully 150 immigrants from the East have arrived in La Grande, Or., during the past month.

Shot Through a School Window.

Two young men shot through a window of the public school at Warm Springs, Malheur county, Or., a few days ago, and afterwards ransacked the house of William Sevier. The case will be called to the attention of the April grand jury.

London has one street seventy feet long, being the shortest street in the city.

Only seventy years have elapsed since the first railway in the world was finished. During that comparatively brief period four hundred thousand miles has been constructed.

The Swiss society Ramberta has laid out an Alpine garden at Montreux, at an elevation of six thousand feet, where the characteristic trees and flowers of the country are to be cultivated.

Steel rails now figure as the cheapest finished product in wrought iron or steel. A good lesson on the finances of modern industry is also afforded by them. To establish a steel rail works, an expenditure of \$3,000,000 is required before a single rail can be turned out. The steel is made to conform to an accurate chemical composition—the most accurate in the ordinary range of technical operations.

In Arizona a railroad company is the builder of a dam to form a reservoir for water for the supply of the locomotives. The dam is curious in being formed partly of steel plates. A masonry foundation runs across the bottom of the gap, and masonry abutments are built on each side, and the center and main portion is a steel frame filled with steel plates. The plates are bent to give them stiffness. The steel portion is 100 feet long and forty feet high, equal to the front of a block of low city houses. The plates are three-eighths of an inch thick.

Timing of a Railway Train.

There are several ways of ascertaining the speed made.

Not one person in a hundred who travels has any idea of the speed of a train, and even a large percentage of the regular trainmen cannot tell with any degree of accuracy. Engineers use their driving wheel as a gauge. They know its circumference, and by counting its revolutions within a certain time can tell very accurately the speed at which they are running.

A favorite method of timing among passengers is to count the telegraph poles. As a rule these poles are planted thirty to the mile, but in prairie countries, where only a single wire is used, so that rule will not always work. The most accurate method, and the most in use by experienced railroad men, is to count the number of rail joints the train passes over in twenty seconds. The rails on nearly all roads are thirty feet in length, and the number passed over in twenty seconds is the speed per hour a train is running.

For instance, if a passenger can count thirty clicks on a rail joint in twenty seconds, the train is running at a speed of thirty miles an hour. Actually, this method falls a little short, as in the example given above the speed would be nearer thirty-one than thirty miles, but it is near enough for all practical purposes.

Balloons in War.

During the expedition to the Sudan the balloon corps were of immense service in disclosing the position and tactics of the enemy. In one particular instance the Sudanese attacked Gen. MacNeill's zereba (earthworks), established to protect the environs of Suakin, near Tama. The attack took place during the night, and before help could arrive most of the British soldiers were horsed combat, although they just managed to keep the zereba from falling into the hands of the enemy. After this Maj. Temple made several ascents with his captive balloon and detected the enemy in the bush preparing to make another attack, while the force in the zereba, thinking that they had quite retired, were totally off guard.

Col. Temple says that the sight of the balloons has a very demoralizing effect upon the natives of these countries, since they cannot find cover from them to hide their movements, for even at night they are easily detected from the balloons by means of the powerful electric searchlights carried in the car. These natives are in the habit of crying out that they cannot fight against troops re-enforced with "young moons."

It is said to be imperfectly developed; it is an inferior specimen of the article and altogether less useful to science; hence its lower market value."

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
