Albany is about to enact a license ordinance which includes everything from a boot black stand to a newspaper. Newspapers will be taxed \$10 per year and a like sum for their job department.

The Appellate court, sitting at Chicago, has unanimously sustained the decision of Judge Tukey, made last summer, that express companies are obliged to furnish revenue stamps to shippers of goods.

The County Fair Meeting.

Shannon and Peter Riley were appointed a committee on grounds. The committee to prepare articles of incorporation consists of H. H. Hewitt, Thos. Froman and Geo. H. Barton.

On motion the meeting adjourned until Friday, March 31, at 1 o'clock p. m., at which time it is hoped to have a response from every portion of Linn county which will show that the people want a county fair and will assist in establishing it upon a sound permanent basis.

It will be a part of the articles of incorporation that the Fair Association shall do business on a cash basis and will incur no indebtedness which it has not the means to pay, and will be a legitimate, moral county fair, with an exhibit of all the products of the county, with all building, feed boxes and other objectionable features eliminated, a fair which will be a credit to the county and the people.

TESTING THE DOCTORS.

Chinese, Like Other Physicians, Reserve the Right to Diagnose.

The emperor of China has lately had so much trouble with his functionaries of every kind that he has grown distrustful of them all. He had noticed that, while his statesmen seemed to be widely at variance, the court physicians agreed beautifully whenever they were called together. But a test that he might make of their skill and sincerity occurred to him.

Feeling somewhat indisposed, the emperor sent for one of his court doctors. These physicians are paid public functionaries and are learned professors. One of them came, listened to his majesty's account of his trouble, diagnosed it, prescribed and took his leave.

Then the emperor sent for another court doctor and gave him exactly the same account of his difficulty. This doctor then made his own diagnosis, which was quite different from his brother physicians, prescribed a different remedy and went his way.

A third and fourth physician were called and each prescribed a different medicine. Then the emperor became angry and also sarcastic, and begged to know how he could have so many things said to him, while he was right, and whether he should continue to live if he took all the diverse sorts of medicine that had that day been prescribed for him.

The doctors could give him no satisfactory answer to these questions, but each insisted that he was right and all the others wrong. But the emperor declared that this could not be true, and condemned every one of the physicians to lose a month's salary.

Of course the moral of this story has no accidental application. Though the doctors of our western countries reserve the right to disagree, such a case of radical divergence probably could not occur under the practice of our perfected science.—Youth's Companion.
