Scio vs. Jefferson.

Last Friday six of Jefferson's crack bowlers came over to Scio to play a series of games with Scio's cracked hat champions. All details of the contest had been previously arranged and immediately after noon the pins began to fly. The score made by each player was as follows: Jefferson—Chas. Zimmerman, 142; Ross Thomas, 126; Fred Walter, 129; Harry Thompson, 146; Wm. Thompson, 143; Wm. L. Jones, 168; total 854. Scio—Joseph Weesly, 169; Henry Hassler, 145; Peter McDonald, 154; A. J. Johnson, 196; J. C. Simpson, 171; A. G. Prill, 154; total, 967. Scio won three games out of the four, with 113 pins net gain, and lost the fourth game by two pins.

It will be seen by the above that Scio beat the score of the Ilahee club, of Salem, which bowled a game with the Jefferson boys a couple of weeks ago, and only made a total of 915 pins in the forty frames. They also beat the score of the Oregon Road club team which bowled in Salem March 14, and which was composed of crack players, they making a score of but 951. Scio don't make any brag about their bowling, but they manage to get down just about as many pins as some of those who do lots of shouting.

On Wednesday the team went to Jefferson and bowled the return games, which resulted as follows:

The Scio boys had a majority of 113 pins, and won one game at Jefferson but the Jefferson boys overcome the surplus pins and won the tournament by 29 pins. When the games were first arranged each team named three extra men, but when the game was called it was found that the Jefferson boys had substituted two of their extra men for others, but our boys took their medicine without a kick.
