BY THE EDITOR

Some very grave and wise discussion is going on in the Eastern papers and magazines regarding the fact that England imports more than she exports and still seems to be doing well. The reason is simply on account of her accumulated wealth. All the world is paying her interest and dividends. The United States, up to three years ago, was paying her annually in interest an amount equal to one-twentieth part of all the gold in the world. Again, Englishmen are operating all over this world, and when we hear that South Africa gives up forty, fifty or sixty millions in gold, we know that the major part of that will gravitate to London and will materialize in the shape of houses, manufactures and a thousand other things in which Englishmen employ their money. By sharp trading, by great machinery and natural advantages of location, by her great merchant marine and a mercantile tariff of one hundred and fifty years, England got to possess quite one-half of this world's wealth. It was then she opened her doors to free trade. It was then she began to import more than she exported. But the truth is, all the time she was drawing interest from nearly every civilized and semi-civilized country on earth and that made it possible for her to seem to draw in more than she sent away and still to be growing rich all the time.

It is now announced definitely that President McKinley will visit the Pacific coast this summer, and will visit Oregon. It is quite likely that the presidential party will make a brief stop at Albany. This western journey which President McKinley mapped out last year and which he was prevented from taking by the war, will be made in midsummer. It will include a visit to the copper deposits of Michigan, and the mining districts of Montana. The Yellowstone Park, an inspection of the Puget Sound country, a trip through the length of Oregon and California and a return journey by way of Texas and New Orleans, thus making very nearly the entire circuit of the United States. The question of a tour of the country by the president whereby he can see for himself the conditions and the people, is most commendable. But few presidents have come as far west as Oregon. Grant, Hayes and Harrison about completes the list. President McKinley will meet a cordial and hearty reception from the people of the west.—Herald.

Two of Oregon's prominent men met a sudden death in the rapid waters of the Umpqua river on Saturday last. They were H. D. McGuire, state fish commissioner, and Senator A. W. Reed, of Douglas county. They were accompanied by Deputy U. S. Fish Commissioner Hubbard, who alone was able to swim ashore and escape a watery grave. The party were going down the Umpqua river in search of a suitable place to establish a fish hatchery, and their boat capsized on the rapids and Hubbard was the only one to escape.

The dispatches announce that Secretary of War Alger will resign as soon as he returns from Cuba, and his place will be taken by General Warren Hastings, who was the commander of President McKinley in the war of the rebellion. This comes from administration circles and is considered definite. The matter was settled some time ago at a conference between the president and his advisers, and it seems likely that a new secretary of war will be installed within a few weeks.

Some of the big eastern newspapers are favoring a proposed scheme of trading the Philippine Islands to Great Britain for the British West Indies. Easterners, of course, would prefer to have new territory nearer their own doors, but the people of the Pacific Coast would very much prefer to keep the rich islands already acquired in the Pacific, and there seems to be no intention on the part of this government or Great Britain to engage in any such trade.

The time to remove tariff protection to the trusts is early in the coming session of congress. To depend on a platform declaration will be deplorably weak. Republicans will claim credit for the war and its results because it was fought under a republican administration. How, then, shall they meet the assertion that under the same rule they are responsible for the trusts?—Oregonian.

Prune Trees Not Injured.

W. A. Bodine, who resides near Albany, has removed to Crabtree station, where he has leased the acre prune orchard of C. S. Harmon. He says the prune trees are budding nicely and will be in bloom within ten days of good weather. They show no sign of injury from the winter freeze. When examined soon after the freezing weather the inner bark had turned dark, but since the warm, growing weather the trees have entirely recovered and the bark appears as fresh, healthy and green as ever. Mr. Bodine, who has had a number of years' experience in the fruit business, says he does not think the prune trees in that locality are injured at all, and he thinks the reported damage to trees in other localities will also prove to be very small.—Herald.

The New Time Table.

The new time table on the Southern Pacific went into effect Sunday evening at 5 o'clock. The overhaul from Portland, which will be known as No. 6, will arrive at 10:55 and leave at 11 o'clock. The overhaul from San Francisco, which will be known as No. 5, will arrive at 4:10 and leave at 4:20. The Roseburg local No. 17 will hereafter be known as No. 7, and the local from the north as No. 8, but he thinks the reported damage to trees in other localities will also prove to be very small.—Herald.

Big Sawmill Deal.

Members of the Booth Kelly Lumber Company and officials of the Southern Pacific railroad have been looking over the ground with a view to selecting a site for a sawmill to be established near Eugene. It is understood the mill will be connected directly with the railroad at some point on the Woodburn-Natron branch. The Booth-Kelly company recently made extensive purchases of timber land tributary to the Mohawk and will engage in lumbering on an extensive scale.

The North Santiam Mines.

C. G. Holt, of Oregon City, who is interested in gold-bearing quartz veins on Gold creek, a tributary of the North Santiam river, in company with Dr. C. Toucher, of Mullin, and F. A. Wheeler and A. Field, of Portland, have gone in to the mines to continue development work. They have run two tunnels, 40 and 72 feet in length, and the rock assays \$11 to \$12 per ton. Mr. Field has been in New York City for several months, and thinks that he has succeeded in interesting capitalists in the venture. During the past winter Mr. Holt has been doing development work for a Salem company on an adjoining claim. The tunnel he tunnel 270 feet in depth, and the ore assays from \$20 to \$75 per ton.—Herald.
