In a few weeks the Oregon volunteers will be home, and with their coming many hearts will be made glad, while others will be turned to mourning. Only one short year ago over one thousand of Oregon's promising young men marched away to fight for the honor of their country. Many have given up their lives in the performance of their duty, some on the field of battle, but more by disease. Those who return will make glad the hearts that await their coming, while their presence will only cause deeper grief to those near and dear to the unfortunate ones who gave up their lives in that far away land.

The Albany city council has passed the much discussed license tax ordinance by a vote of four to two. It provides for taxing all kinds of trades, professions and business.

In general the sentiment against the law, says the Democrat, that only three business men refused to sign the remonstrance which was presented to the council. Albany is so deeply in debt, however, that something has got to be done to raise more revenue to pay off interest.

Seven years ago the people of Tillamook county turned their attention to dairying. Since that time more than a dozen creameries have been successfully established in the county. In the year 1898 these creameries turned out 17,347 pounds of butter and 31,301 pounds of cheese which netted the farmers patronizing these creameries, \$18,514.

The Boston millionaire who boasts that he is the man who has been sending documents to the Philippines urging our soldiers to choose in the face of the enemy must be badly off for something to brag about.

It seems impossible to kill the Oregon boys in the Philippine war. One of the Pendleton boys was hit in a pocket, where he had a lot of cartridges. The bullet struck a cartridge and glanced off doing no damage.
