The Jefferson Bicycle club has decided to test the bicycle tax law, and for the purpose have engaged Hon. J. K. Weatherford of Albany. It is said the law is unconstitutional.

The Oregon Telegraph & Telephone Company is getting poles out to its Prineville line as fast as possible, and from all appearances The Dalles and Prineville will be connected by wire within two months.

Tuesday last M. M. Peery was appointed agent for Wells, Fargo & Co., at this place, W. F. Gill having resigned. Mr. Peery will make a good agent and one who will look well to the interest of the company.

Mrs. Dr. Little died at her home in Albany last Saturday evening April 29 1899, at the age of 81 years after an illness of several months. An operation was performed in the forenoon, but it could not save her.

The remains of Miss Etta Brown were interred at the Providence cemetery Tuesday. She was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. James Brown, who live about eight miles north of Jefferson, and was 19 years of age.

Monday was by no means a typical Oregon May day. Rain and hail fell in heavy showers most all day, and the clouds overhead were so dense that one would about arrive at the conclusion that old Sol had lost his job.

With the coming of good weather work will be commenced on Johnson & Phillips' new grain warehouse. The contract has already been let for a stone foundation for the structure, and work on it will commence in a short time.

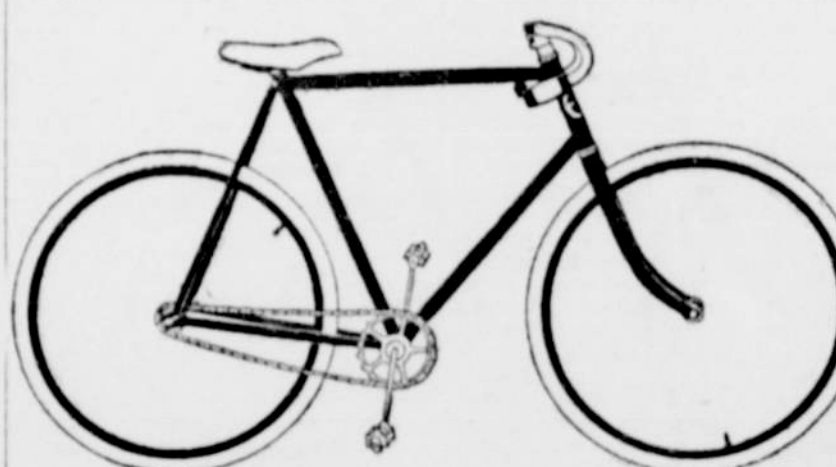
