Secretary of the Navy Long made

an earnest and patriotic defense of

President McKinley's policy in his

speech at the Boston banquet. It

wouldn't have done any harm,

though, if he had incidentally ex-

plained a few things about the treat-

ment the Navy Department has

given gallant Admiral Schley.

The Austrian war office is in-

vestigating a new magazine rifle, the

invention of a 17-year old boy named

Ivan Mapan of Nowigrad. The gun

takes fifteen cartridges at a load, and

it is said that it can be discharged

at the rate of forty shots a minute.

The invention is about to be tested

at the Imperial arsenal in Vienna.

The monthly statement of the

public debt issued May 1 shows that

at the close of business April 29,

1899, the debt less cash in the treas-

ury amounted to \$1,172,587,254, an

increase during the month of \$23,-

087,701. This is accounted for by

the payment of \$20,000,000 to Spain

in settlement of treaty obligations.

Fourth of July celebration in Port-

land one of the grandest displays

ever witnessed in the West. The

Oregon volunteers will be back in

time to take part in the parade, and

editors will proclaim to the world

JONATHAN WASSOM.

Lebanon Honored Citizen and Pi-

etier of 1848 Dead.

Hon. Jonathan Wassom, of Leba-

non, one of Linn county's most

prominent and best citizens, died at

7:30 o'clock Friday morning May 3,

suddenly, of heart trouble, follow-

ing an illness of the grippe and

pneumonia.

Mr. Wassom has been prominent

before the people of the valley for a

great many years, a strong factor

in its up-building. Besides posses-

sing wealth he was a man of integ-

erity, and was universally esteemed.

He once represented Linn county in

the state legislature. He came to

Oregon in 1846 and to Linn county

in 1847, locating at Lebanon, his

home since then. Wassom's addition

to Seattle was named after him.

The funeral service were held

Sunday at 10 a. m. under the aus-

pices of the Masons, of which order

he was an old member.—Democrat.

from live San Jose scale. About

at Hamburg, Germany, from the

United States consists of prunes.
