## BY THE EDITOR

The Lebanon Critic pays Hon. A. J. Johnson, of Scio, the following just compliments:

"The action of the Oregon delegation in congress, in recommending the appointment of Hon. A. J. Johnson, of Scio, as National bank examiner for this district will meet with a hearty approval at the hands of our people. Mr. Johnson is a young man of recognized ability and integrity and his long experience in the banking business gives him that special qualification so much needed in that position. Should he receive the appointment which he no doubt will, the favor will be greatly appreciated by his many friends in this county."

Russia is much interested in the controversy between Great Britain and the Transvaal. It is important to the future welfare of the czar's country that Great Britain should not overwhelmingly conquer the Boers, but should be involved in a conflict with and be crippled by them. Russia's great desire is to see another power sap Great Britain's mighty strength while the bear is growing stronger. Great Britain has not so much the Transvaal to fear as the actions of other powers in Asiatic waters while giving her attention to south Africa.

President Kruger declares that the result of the war will be to make South Africa free of the white man's grave. If the latter result comes to pass there are several millions of blacks—slavish, subdued, but still full of hate for both Dutch and English—who would doubtless take great satisfaction in attending the funeral.

It took months of effort to raise \$50,000 for the Dewey residence fund and only a week to obtain \$100,000 in subscriptions for the permanent Dewey arch in New York. Which suggests that the enthusiastic citizens of the metropolis are after all, considerably more interested in New York than they are in Dewey.

The Brownsville Times has opposed the purchase of a town clock for the court house at Albany, and we are just about of the Times, opinion; that if the people of Albany really want a clock in the court house tower, they should purchase it themselves. The county does its share when it furnishes the place for the clock.

Robert H. Wilson, a correspondent in the Oregonian, cannot vote for either Bryan or McKinley, and preys for an independent party with Dewey or Roosevelt at the head of it. In other words, Mr. Wilson desires to take out of the Republican party one of two men who have endorsed the McKinley administration.

The present white population of the Transvaal is 150,000 counting Boers and Uitlanders. There are signs that a large British immigration may shortly take place, and if it does, the Boers hope to so arrange things that a great many of the newcomers shall permanently "settle" in Transvaal soil.

Iowa has a gorgeous asylum for the insane which cost over \$1,000,000 and is said to be the finest building of its character in the country. If one wishes to "dwell in marble halls" in Iowa all he has to do is to get "looney."

## A FEW FARM NOTES

Good hogs were selling in Chicago October 5 at \$4.40 to 4.70. One year ago on that date the price was \$3.60 to \$3.75.

The price of extra fine steers on the Chicago market October 5 was \$6.40 to 7.00, against \$5.50 to \$7.75 one year ago.

If possible every load of manure from the East lately at the rate of \$1.00 per ton, and should be hauled out and spread on the land this fall.

The Oregon Poultry Journal says the exhibit of fowls at the Oregon State Fair this year was superior in quality to previous exhibits although not so large as last year.

On Monday, Oct. 2, a carload of Shorthorn steers sold in Chicago at \$7 per cwt. The average weight of the steers was 1,650 pounds and the average price per head, \$15.50.

Eggs have been coming to Portland from the East lately at the rate of about a carload a week. It requires eight or ten carloads of wheat to pay for one carload of eggs at present prices.

The blight which attacked potato vines in Oregon and Washington this fall was not confined to the overflow lands along the Columbia river, but appeared to be equally bad in some places on the uplands.

Much has been said in Oregon in the past year or two about the necessity of changing the system of farming in the wide growing sections of the Willamette valley. The men who see this most clearly and are most emphatic in their statements are to the necessity of keeping more stock on the farms are pioneer farmers who from a life time's experience here are eminently fitted to give an opinion upon this matter.

It is announced that the Oregon State Fair paid all premiums and expenses and has a small balance remaining in the treasury. This fact shows a wonderful improvement in the management of the fair from a financial standpoint. The attendance at the fair was less than at any previous fair for many years. Unusually favorable circumstances twice as many people will attend the fair next year as were there this year.

A hen will consume about three ounces of solid food per day, estimated as food basis. From this can be calculated the amount of food necessary for a flock of 100 hens. If the flock is closely confined it will take a little more, if free range not quite so much. Bone meal and grit must always be kept before the fowls constantly. In absence of meat fowls use beef meal, once each day in soft ground food, from one to one and a half pounds per day to each twenty-five fowls.

## BY THE SCISSORS

In a suit tried at Salem this week the plaintiff was offered \$400 by the defendant for a settlement, but the plaintiff wouldn't settle, he wanted the whole \$500 sued for. The jury returned a verdict for the defendant and the plaintiff thus got nit.

A Jefferson dispatch says that two boys, Mosier, of Albany, and Hoss, of Douglas county, escaped from the reform school Monday morning and were captured near that city last Tuesday by W. L. James and G. H. Hoyt and returned to the school.

Mrs. Henry Hewitt, mother of Judge Hewitt, of Albany died at her home in Wheatland, Yamhill county last Friday at the age of 67 years. She was a pioneer of 1812 and the mother of ten children. Oregon thus loses another one of her noble pioneer women.

J. H. Chapman, a pioneer of 1845 died at his home near Eugene on the 15th at the age of 83 years. His father was a soldier in the war of 1812 and his great grandfather in the Revolution war of 1776. His wife with whom he lived over sixty years survives him.

A Massachusetts farmhand who shot and killed a 14-year-old girl recently justified his act by saying a milkster had been found for the sheriff to mistake him for a murderer and hang him, the second error would probably not excite a great deal of public grief.

W. W. Thayer, of Portland, died Monday at the age of 72 years. He came to Oregon in 1862 from New York state, and has taken a leading part in Oregon affairs, being governor one term and supreme judge one term. While Governor, Hon. F. J. Stites, of Albany was his private secretary. The Oregonian pays him a high tribute as a lawyer, official and man.

The Oregon Native Son is an illustrated monthly magazine of history published in Portland, and deserves the support of every patriotic resident of the Pacific Northwest. It is devoted to the history of the original Oregon, is well printed on glazed paper, is beautifully illustrated, and the subscription price is but one dollar per annum. S. C. Gillespie, who was arrested at Cottage Grove on the charge of having robbed and murdered Mrs. Edison a lady nearly 80 years old, at Gold Beach, Curry county, has made a confession. Gillespie says he compelled her to give up \$11.75 and a pension check and then because she said she had no more, he strangled her and poured coal oil over her body and set the house on fire. He is now in jail at Coquille City. He is a fiend of the first order.

A Canadian editor, being asked if he had ever seen a bald-headed woman, replied: "No, we never did. For have we ever seen a woman waiting around town in her shirt sleeves, with a cigar between her teeth. We have never seen a woman angling with a bottle in her hip pocket, sit on the damp ground all day and then go home drunk at night.
