

Care of the Qrohard.

A bulletin just issued by the Ore-

gon Experiment station at Corvallis The past year, with its unusual limatic conditions, has been marked by a signal neglect of tillage op-erations in the orchards of the state. bel One result of this has been the for-mation of an extra large amount of fruit wood and buds, and under or-it. which usually takes place on elec-tion day, and would give all a chance to speak for their own can-didate. It may be the means of dinary conditions, next spring there giving the candidates for the sever-al positions a chance to express pruning this winter, to the end that be had, otherwise the more expensive work of hand thinning must be done or else there will be produced a mass of small inferior fruit of which no market can be found and as too often occurs the larger part of

the crop becomes a waste. Now is the time to make a thorough examination of the trees, study the various systems of prun-ing and the ends they are sought to reach. Watch the insects and fun-gous foes and the climate effects upon the fruit and foliage buds, and with the opening of spring be prepared to give the orchard a vigorous but judicious pruning and then fol-low this with generous tillage of the soil. Only under conditions these can we expect to get the best of returns from the orchard next year, under the u sual Oregon climat

A Rye Sod Kills Potato Scab

Alva Agee makes a very interesting potato note in the Ohio Farmer. He says:
"Another year's experience con-

firms my statement made a year ago in The Farmer that one can control potato scab by the use of a rye sod, if this is done in the right way. This is the fifth year of an experi-ment on two acres of land that had become so infested with scab that a decent crop of potatoes could not be grown. Five successive crops of po-tatoes could not be grown. Five grown, Five successive crops of po-tatoes could not be grown. Five successive crops of potatoes have been grown in this land, turning a rye sod under each spring, and the seed used a portion of the time has not been wholly free from scab and has been untreated with any solution to kill the germs, but the crop is above the average in smoothness. The seed last spring, coming from northern Ohlo, had more scab than seemed safe, but so far as examination of the nills now indicates the crop will be all right. If the rye can be turned during a hot spell in the spring, it makes the soil a little acid and that is fatal to the scab germs. Two years of that treatment practically changed the field." ally cleaned the field."
