The material for Scio's telephone system has arrived and next week the workman will be here to put in the system. All who have 'phones will have free switching to the S. P. depot at West Scio, and this alone will be worth more to our business men than the cost of the phone and in some instances many times over. Most of the business men have ordered instruments put in their places of business, and others will

do so as soon as they are made to realize the benefit to be derived from them.

There will be an entertainment at the city hall in this city on Wednesday evening of next week given by home talent, and the proceeds are to go to the assembly hall seating fund. A very entertaining program has been arranged, and the affair promises to be a very pleasant one, well worth the price of admission, which has been placed at the very small figure of 10 cents. As the money goes to a good cause all should attend and help seat the hall, as it is now badly needed, and cannot be used until it is seated. Don't forget the date, Wednesday evening, November 13.

A new time card on the Woodburn-Natron branch of the Southern Pacific is talked of, and if put into effect will greatly accommodate the people of this section. Under the new arrangement the train from Woodburn which now arrives in the evening will get here about half past two, and will enable our people to reach the city by the way of Tallahassee about four o'clock. There is now a \$1 round trip rate from here to Albany earlier train service would draw most all the travel from this locality, which now goes over the C. & E. road from Manuka. The change will be a good one if put into effect.

It has many symptoms of smallpox, still the physicians in Albany who have attended similar cases declare that it is not the regulation smallpox. There are no cases in Scio as yet, although it is quite likely there will be, and every precaution should be taken to prevent its spread. There are many cases in the county, but so far no deaths have resulted directly from it.

This has been a hard year for the Oregon farmer, but they all seem to get along some with a few years' and with the help of a few good crops the effects of this odd year will be gone, and all will be as lappy as ever before.

## The Corner Stone Laid.

It was raining quite hard, but this did not detract from the enthusiasm and interest taken in these ceremonies. While the corner stone was being laid Saturday, the building itself is well on the way to completion, but this being the first industrial enterprise at Scio, a number of the citizens thought it right and proper to have a "corner stone celebration," and Mr. Larimore, manager for the company kindly acceded to the request and aided in many ways to make it a success.

Mr. R. Shelton was the orator of the day, and in a few well chosen remarks, set forth the benefit, the establishment of this enterprise for Scio and the farmers in the surrounding country, in the creating of a pay roll, something needed in every city and town to insure its growth and success. His words were welcome to the enterprise—were especially fitting, assuring the company of the real interest he and the people of Scio took in this giant.

Mr. Larimore responded on behalf of his company, thanking the people for the interest manifested, and assuring them of the hearty cooperation of his company in any thing calculated to build up Scio. He was followed by Mr. A. D. Reynolds, who spoke very happily of the flax industry, urging the farmers to fall in line with this enterprise now started in their midst.
