Death of Mrs. Mary S. Leigh

Mrs. Mary S. Leigh departed this life at her home in Monmouth, Polk county, Ore., Monday, November 13, 1899, aged 55 years, four months and five days.

She was born in Marshall county, Ill., July 8, 1844, and came across the plains with her parents Mr. and Mrs. E. H. Randall, in 1847 arriving first at Oregon City, where they resided for a time, after which they moved to Polk county and settled near Dallas. In 1848 they moved to Scio and settled on the Donation claim one mile south of this city. On May 16, 1851, she was married to E. M. Brown, and they lived together near Scio until Mr. Brown's death, which occurred Jan. 11th, 1884, and to them two boys and five girls were born, the oldest girl dying in infancy, but the others are still living.

In 1880 she was married to J. C. Leigh, and they resided in Scio until the fall of '86, when they moved to North Dakota, but on account of ill health of Mr. Leigh they moved to Minn., and from there they went to Iowa, where Mr. Leigh died October 26, 1896, after which Mrs. Leigh returned to Scio, where she resided until last May when she moved to Monmouth, where she remained until her death. One daughter or was born to her and Mr. Leigh, and which still survives her at the age of twelve years. When a young girl Mrs. Leigh united herself with the M. E. church, and retained her membership in that church until recently, when she united herself with the C. P. Church at this place, being a member of the same at the time of her death. She was a Christian woman, a kind and faithful mother, loved and respected by all, and by her death one more of our pioneer mothers has passed over the dark river to that far beyond, from whence no traveler returns. The surviving members of her family together with numerous relatives have the sympathy of the entire community in this hour of deepest grief.

The remains were brought to this city Tuesday last, and the funeral took place at the Masonic cemetery, near this city, the remains being laid beside those of her departed parents.
